Appositives

Appositives - Defined

- An <u>appositive</u> is a noun or pronoun with modifiers which adds <u>extra</u> information or details.
 - appositives generally <u>identify</u>, <u>rename</u>, or <u>explain</u>.
 - sentences are still complete and make sense if the appositive is removed.
 They are easy to identify because they are often surrounded by commas.

- My car, which is very old, won't start when the weather gets too cold.
- Does the appositive identify, rename, or explain?
 – explain
- What punctuation surrounds the appositive?
 - commas
- How would the sentence read with it removed?
 - My car won't start when the weather gets too cold. CSIntervention

 My cat, Sweetums, is actually very unfriendly.

• Which word is the appositive in the above sentence?

- Sweetums

 My cat is actually very unfriendly.
