At this stage in our career eight fell by the wayside, but we were joined by Helen Bach, Lawrence Krueger, Lorraine Krueger, Paul Sabin, George Sperl and Stanley Stygar. With a membership of 60, we planned and carried out one of the most successful proms in S. H. S. history. Our king, Claude Peotter, and his queen, Gerrie Lorenz, led the grand march to the strains of Fran Meekin and his orchestra. We concluded our junior year, packed with fun and thrills, by presenting a play "The Yellow Shadow", which was directed by Doris George.

The beginning of our senior year found us back with 57 still in the ranks. We were glad to welcome Doris and Dorothy Meyer to compensate partially for five who were unable to continue. Being the first wartime senior class we played an important part in organizing the Victory Corps and the various activities connected therewith. We helped stage a successful Carnival, and our class play "Going Places" was pronounced one of the best. Two of our members, John Stonis and Stanley Stygar, entered the service, and two others, Ted Hawkins, and James Wiese, joined the Army and Navy Reserves at the University of Wisconsin. Bill Kimball has served ably as class president during our senior year. Our motto "Deeds, not Words" is a challenge to all of us as we leave the halls of Seymour High.

Victory Corps



Almost 100 members of our student body are entitled to wear a special insignia indicating that they are members of the High School Victory Corps. Furnishing speakers to organizations in the community, conducting salvage drives, promoting the sale of War stamps and bonds to students and teachers, knitting wearing apparel for men in the armed forces, providing assembly programs for the High School, building model aircraft to be turned over to the government for instructional purposes, training students to be of service on the home front, and collecting books for men and women in the service--these are among the subjects undertaken in the Victory Corps program.

Students who are general members and contributing to some of the above activities, may apply for membership in one of the following special "branches": Sea Service, Land Service, Air Service, or Community Service. Requirements differ as to type of service, but in general provide that a student, to be eligible, must elect subjects in the curriculum that will best fit him for participation in the war effort.

Introduction of the Victory Corps has been a large undertaking, and has made necessary some major revisions in our schedule of classes. However, the enthusiastic support of the student body has made it possible for the program to succeed in accomplishing its purpose--making a real contribution to the War effort.

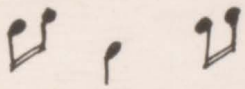

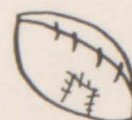

"Going Places"

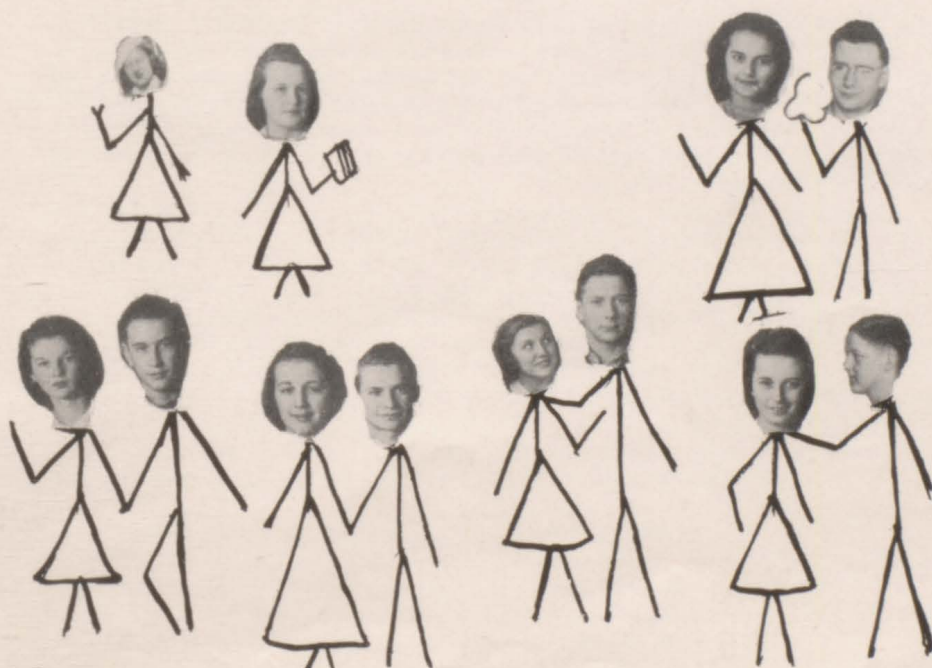

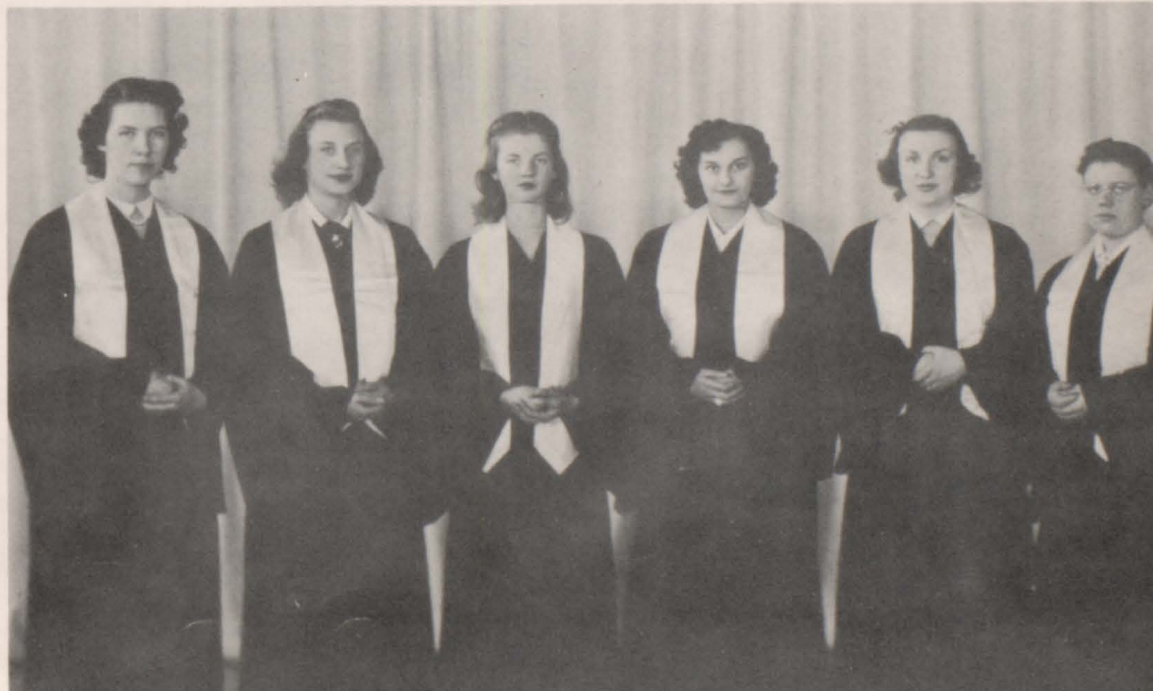

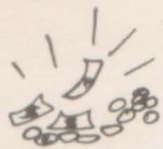

S. A. F. dues were collected twice during this last school year. A quarter each month was contributed, and membership in the organization entitled the student to see feature attractions and basketball games during the school year.



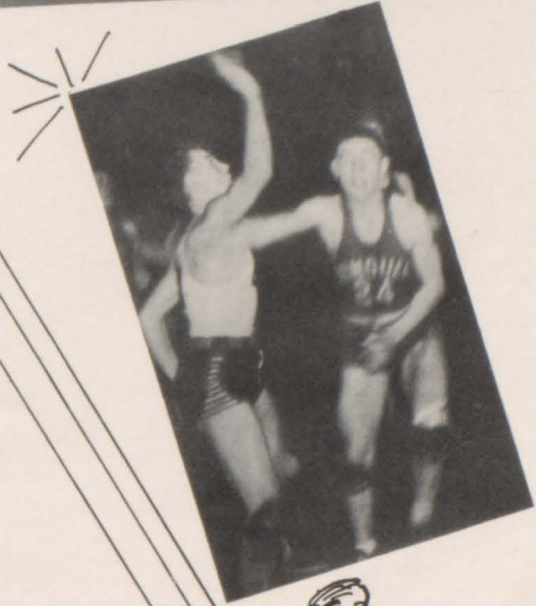
