

"A" SQUAD

Seymour started its 1951 season with about nine returning lettermen. Among the nine were Dick Sachs, John Wurtzel, Jerry Wickesberg, Jim Tubbs, Larry Wirth, Bud Severson, Dave Husman, Dallis Goerl and LaVern Sassman. This year we started off with a new coach, Mr. Pieper and a "Split T" formation instead of the "Straight T." Mr. Wolk was named Athletic Director, head basketball coach and assistant coach in football.

Our first game with Gibraltar was a big success with the score 31-0. Dave Husman played a fine game. At Sturgeon Bay the rain hindered our speed and we lost by one touchdown. A freak pass lost the Algoma game for us. Oconto was next on our list and during the opening minute of the game, Dick Sachs made a ninety-seven yard run. We played the champs at Kewaunee in a hard fought game. Wickesberg and Wurtzel distinguished themselves throughout the entire game.

Bud Severson sparked the team to a brilliant Homecoming victory by defeating East De Pere 18-6. This was the first Homecoming victory in the school history.







"ALL CAST PARTY"


