The first Ripper on file was printed in 1922, when the newspaper was titled "The Frog Corner's Gazette" and the school featured an orchestra. Because of the long span of years between the Rippers, the 1927 and 1937 books contained an alumni directory. The copy for the books was typed and then photographed.

In 1937 the new addition to the building was pictured in the Ripper. S.H.S. sponsored a Carnival rather than a Homecoming, but the organizations were similar. In 1941 the forty-page annual was re-named the Ka-Na-Da-Yen, but only for one year. The '42 annual first mentioned the Blue Jay and in 1943 S.H.S. had its first fellow cheerleader. We were reminded of the war when the Serviceman's Honor Roll and the Victory Corps appeared in the '43 edition.

As we paged through the Rippers of 1944 through 1952, we found that Mr. Patchett became Principal of S.H.S. in 1946 and in 1947 Seymour had a Homecoming instead of a Carnival. The senior class of 1951 introduced the hard cover again, after being absent for a number of years, while the class of 1952 increased the number of pages to sixty-eight and improved the quality of the cover. Seventy-two pages make up the nineteenth edition of the Seymour High School annual, and the class of 1953 boasts of a circulation of 500.

We believe the Ripper means more to the graduates as time passes by, and we wish success to the staff of the twentieth edition.
