The Future Homemakers of America has eight purposes which it promotes. They are as follows:

One of the larger organizations at Seymour High is the F.F.A., or the Future Farmers of America. One of the organization's many purposes is to encourage its members in the development of individual farming programs and to make an establishment in farming. Another purpose is to develop character, train for useful citizenship, and foster patriotism.
To become a member of the F.F.A., the student must be enrolled in a class in Agriculture, be familiar with the purposes of the F.F.A. and the program of work of the local chapter; also each member must be able to recite from memory the Creed of the Future Farmers of America. If the candidate receives a majority vote of the members present at a regular meeting, he can become a member.
There are two grades of active membership in the F.F.A. chapter. One is the Green Hand Degree and the other is the Chapter Farmer Desree. In order to have the Chapter Farmer Degree, one must have held the Degree of Green Hand for at least one year and must have had a record of satisfactory participation in the activities of the chapter.
Officers of the chapter are elected annually by a majority vote of members present at a regular meeting. Chapter officers have to hold the Degree of Chapter Farmer before they can be elected. No person can
hold the same office two years in succession. He must have a good Farming Program in operation and must have handed in a satisfactory Supervised Program Record book from the previous year. He must have "C" average or above in all subjects for the first semester of the current year.
The officers and the chairmen in charge of major sections of the annual program of work will constitute the Chapter Executive Committee. This committee has full power to act for the chapter according to actions taken at chapter meetings and regulations or by-laws adopted from time to time.
There are regular meetings held once a month during the school year and once a month during the remaining year at the time and place designated by the Chapter Executive Committee. The two delegates sent to the State F.F.A. Convention are the President Elect and the Treasurer Elect for the ensuing year.
One of the many activities the F.F.A. chapter has is Earnings and Savings. To make more money for the F.F.A., this chapter sells such things as magazines, gloves, and pop at basketball games. It also sells tickets sponsoring a movie.
Many members show their efforts at the county fairs.
Mr. Lerum and Mr. Tech are the advisors of the organization.

There are reports on activities of various school clubs and organizations. Then to challenge the intellectuals, there is a crossword puzzle.
News plus entertainment equals the "Blue Jay."

## 1958-59 SEASON

The guard positions were filled by three-year letterman Larry Mory and two-year letterman Phil Heuser, the team's M. V. P.

As a matter of fact, Heuser and Mory were two of the leading scorers. Dick Shaw and Rodney Krull were the able reserves who saw plenty of action.

The Indians opened the season by winning five con-
secutive games, three conference and two non-conference.
