Guidance Center

With the completion of the new addition to our school, a room was facilitated for a school Guidance Center, which opened in February. During the first semester Mr. Donald Taylor assisted students as Guidance Director. At the end of the semester Mr. Taylor left to attend a suidance institute at the University of Wisconsin. Mr. Douglas Steuber then continued the program for the remainder of the year. The Guidance Center serves as a place where students are able to seek assistance in vocational planning and in personal adjustment. Counseling interviews, testing and group discussions in homeroom guidance periods were activities that were used in this program. Each homeroom saw one film a month and held several discussions on current social problems during Friday morning suidance periods. The counseling and testing program of the State Employment Service was part of activities for seniors. Seniors also attended a College night program at Clintonville, where they discussed plans for further education with college representatives.
Assisting students in locating occupational and education materials in the Guidance Center were student receptionists from the commercial classes. Also several girls from these classes helped with stenographic tasks. The school guidance program is coordinated by the Guidance Director with the assistance of a faculty guidance committee.
