




The students of Seymour Union High School would like to extend a very appreciative vote of thanks to Mr. Main.


His fifteen years as a member of our faculty, both as a teacher and principal, have also been the students' gain of fifteen years of achievement.




The outlook for the 1961 season is fairly good, as the top seven men of last year will be back.

1960 Varsity Jootball Season

The season ended with a very hard fought game against traditional rivals, the Pulaski Red Raiders. This was probably one of the Indian's best games offensively and an especially good game was played by the seniors. Final score was Pulaski 28—Seymour 19.

The team developed well as they progressed through the year and with a few breaks, they might have had a more successful season. Most of the returning lettermen are looking forward to next year's season. The team elected Merlin Maass and Pete Blom co-captains and Jim Fischer, Most Valuable Player for the season.









1960-61 Varsity Basketball Season
