Elisabeth attended the following classes this year:

Arts & Crafts, U. S. History, American Problems, Speech and Journalism, Reading Improvement, Physical Education, and English IV.

She found American school systems to be easier and the students to have more social life in comparison with the Swiss schools.

Some of the things Elisabeth said she would remember most were: 1. her first day at Seymour High, 2. the Homecoming and Prom, 3. President Kennedy's assassination, 4. New York City, and 5. the interest the people of this community had in her and her country and the warmth with which they greeted her.

Elisabeth will leave Seymour around June 20 and will join a group of A.F.S. students for a tour of some of the larger American cities. On July 25 she will return to her home.





This year the main project of the Student Council was receiving the first SCHS foreign exchange student, Elisabeth Graf from Zurich, Switzerland.


The Council was in charge of the '63 Homecoming. The main theme was centered around the alumni of SCHS.

Extemporaneous Speaking: the topic is some current affair. The contestant has an hour to prepare an eight-minute speech. The speaker may use note cards to deliver this speech.

Original Oration: an original eight-minute speech prepared and memorized by the contestant. Non-Original Oration: an eight-minute speech given from memory by the contestant but written by someone else. Interpretative Reading of Prose: the activity of reading aloud from literature with the printed page before the reader.

Play Reading: the only group activity is a scriptin-hand, interpretive reading of a portion of a play. Try-outs for parts in the plays were held and the cast was selected by the coach.

Twenty-two SCHS forensics students participated in a project dubbed "Operation Forensics" when they traveled to Bayport High School, near Howard-Suamico, on March 11.

The purpose of the trip was to demonstrate to the Bayport students just what's involved in a forensics program and how profitable it is. The forensics program is well worth the time and effort involved in preparing a speech, reading or declamation. Forensics helps develop self-confidence, personality, poise, and a speaking ability to be proud of.

Forensics members were coached by four coaches this year: Miss Dolores Holmes, chairman, and coaching original and non-original oratory, and public address; Mrs. Eleanor Piehl, play reading and interpretive reading of prose; Mr. Edward Kocha, memorized declamations and interpretive reading of prose; and Mr. Anthony Sittarich, extemporaneous speaking and four-minute speech.


