
















This book is a pictorial representation of the training received by every student as he is indoctrinated in the duties and responsibilities he must take up in the position of a United States citizen.

JUNIOR CLASS


This year's junior class ranked second in size with a total of 189 students enrolled.

Mr. S. Thomas Day, Mr. Harold Tech, and Mr. Loren Cismoski were the class advisors.





Students who attended summer school programs last year are: Fred Husman, Joy Haefs, Sally Miller, and Richard Jochman.



Committees within the council are formed voluntarily by representatives and alternates. The chairmen of the committees are appointed by the executive committee. These seven groups organize the various activities of the student council.

A revision of the student council constitution was made. The members, particularly the constructive criticism committee, are rewriting an improved student handbook.

The council's advisors are Mr. Floyd Smith, Miss Judith Severson, and Mr. Robert Comstock.

The Quill and Scroll Society was founded on April 10, 1926, as an honorary society for high-school age journalists. It was organized to recognize and reward ability and achievement in writing and other journalistic work in high school.

The purpose of the organization is to instill in students the idea of scholarship, to advance the standards of the profession by developing better journalists, to produce a higher code of ethics, and to promote exactness, clear thinking, and clear, forceful writing.

Since its organization, the Quill and Scroll Society has

granted charters to over 7,000 schools. Seymour Community High School received its charter in 1948, but the local chapter did not become active until a few years ago. New members are selected by the advisors of the club in the spring of the year. They are selected on the basis of outstanding work on either the "Ripper" or the "Blue Jay" and are installed at a candlelight ceremony which is held in the spring.

Qualifications for membership are decided by the executive board of the national organization, and all memberships must be approved by the secretary-treasurer of the society.

From the moment Dale Heagle galloped 74 yards for a touchdown on the opening play in the first game with Marion, Seymour's varsity football team was destined for success.

The Indians went on to defeat Marion 14—0 and win four other games to make 1965 that longed-for and long overdue season of victories.

After that preliminary test, the Indians bussed to Sturgeon Bay for their first NEW Conference tilt. There they upset the Clippers 18—12 in a thrilling come-from-behind action, as quarterback Ron Mueller threw two touchdown strikes to John Powless and another scoring pass to Vern Freemore. The tribe now had their first conference victory under their belts after 38 consecutive setbacks and traveled home in wild delirium. The victory bug was still biting hard the following week when they bested their traditional rivals, the Pulaski Red Raiders, 13—0 in their first home game. A scoreless deadlock was ended late in the third quarter when Bill Fischer recovered a blocked punt deep in Pulaski territory to set up a Heagle touchdown.

But then came disaster. On a cold Saturday night at Oconto Falls, the Panthers jumped to a 20—0 advantage before Seymour rallied late in the third stanza. Mueller's three paydirt pitches were not enough as Seymour, without the aid of injured place kicker Ron Buchmann, tallied only one extra point.

Despite high hopes for a victory, Homecoming festivities were dampened by a 15—7 loss to Kewaunee the next week. Although Jim Danforth sped 51 yards for a TD in the first quarter, Seymour was unable to contain the visitors' deadly outside running game.

Scoring on drives of 99, 65, and 63 yards, the Indians resumed their winning ways in Algoma's mud trounching the Wolves 20—0 on a wet, drizzly night. Seymour took their only severe drubbing 40—13 from West DePere, the eventual undefeated conference champs who won their closest game by two touchdowns. At Bonduel the following week the slumping Indians lost their second single point decision 7—6 even though they gained twice as many yards as the Bears.

The highlight of the season was the final game against Oconto. Past shortcomings were easily forgotten as our gridders overwhelmingly obliterated the Blue Devils 37—0. Halfback Heagle ended the season as spectacularly as he had begun it, scoring four touchdowns, setting up a fifth, and intercepting a pass at the goal line to stymie Oconto's only threat.

Head coach Tom Mettlach was the mastermind of the strategy which brought victory back to Seymour. Together with assistants Walter Chapman, Joseph Unrein, and Paul Shusta, he molded 30 individuals into a team Seymour could be proud of.

Captains Vern Freemore and John Powless provided the squad with leadership. Freemore, an end on the first defensive unit and the second offensive platoon of the All-Conference team, also won the most valuable player trophy. Heagle, an All-NEW halfback who piled up 888 yards rushing and was also the leading scorer with 61 points, first in kickoff returns, second in punt returns, and third in pass receiving, was the obvious choice for the best offensive player award. The best defensive player was aggressive middle guard Bill Fischer. The most improved player, tackle Steve Wickesberg, was an offensive lineman on the All-Conference squad. Another standout was junior signal caller Ron Mueller who completed 61 of 112 passes for 970 yards and 12 touchdowns, with a completion percentage of 58.9.

The offense scored 147 points during the season for an average of 16.3 points per game, while the defense held opponents to 95 points for an average of 10.6. The team averaged 236 yards per game and held opponents to a game average of 167 yards.

to the ability and experience of the debaters. Each C level debater was assigned to a B level team to provide for individual help.


The proposition debated this year was "Resolved: That the federal government should adopt a program of compulsory arbitration in labor-management disputes in basic industries."

An added attraction to the mixed chorus was the madrigal, a select group of sixteen singers who performed at various meetings and banquets, and also participated in the music tournament.











Four seniors, John Selmer, Ralph Smits, Rob Olsen, and Steve Wickesburg, completed their varsity competition this year.


