We experience responsibility, the challenges of competition, and the rewards and satisfactions of a worthwhile organization.



















PERSIO, FOREIGN EXCHANGE STUDENT

Persio Freitas arrived in America on August 19, 1966, at 6:00 P.M. He made his home with Mr. and Mrs. Stan Butters and his three American brothers Robert, Terry, and Randy. In Brazil Persio left behind his three sisters. Also living with him were two

children who lost their parents.

Persio's school in Brazil differs somewhat from Seymour High School. A school day there is usually no more than five hours. Their schools are divided into three shifts: morning, afternoon, and night. Another difference is that they don't have each subject everyday, and with the exception of laboratory and engineering, the teachers change rooms for each class, not the pupils. Persio's class day in America consists of English, American Problems, speech, math, French, and physical education. The subjects don't differ much from those in Brazilian high schools.

Persio was brought to the United States with the help of the Seymour American Field Service chapter. Though this organization is not actually a club, many students and adults worked long hours. The AFS is under the direction of a five man adult committee, which works with the student committee. Their main goal throughout the year is to earn enough money to make it possible for a foreign exchange student to come to Seymour each year and also help the student previously there to adjust to the Seymour life and faces.






Each member of the staff held either an editor's position, where he was responsible for a certain section of the paper, or worked as a reporter and covered social and classroom events.









When SCHS's varsity gridders chalked up four impressive victories this season, the Indians were suddenly on top of the Northeastern Wisconsin Conference.

The Indians started off with a 19-12 upset over Bayport on touchdown runs by Jim and Steve Danforth and quarterback Ron Mueller's paydirt pitch to Jerry Kranzush. The following week the Indians handed Sturgeon Bay's Clippers their only loss of the season, 25-6.

At Pulaski, reserve halfback Tony Skenandore scored three touchdowns to lead the Indians to a 33-7 massacre of the archrival Raiders. But in the process, SCHS lost top offensive star Jim Danforth for the season with a broken collarbone.

The Indians bested Oconto Falls 14-7 on Gene Danforth's 40 yard punt return and Skenandore's 45 yard interception runback in the fourth quarter.

But the bubble burst at Kewaunee as the hosts scored a 24-0 victory after Skenandore, Kranzush, Gene and Steve Danforth were helped from the field. The Indians returned home with only a remnant of what had once been the best backfield in the area.

Demoralized, the team dropped a 12-0 decicsion to Algoma in the homecoming game. SCHS was unable to get back on the victory trail, losing their remaining three games, including a 7-6 heartbreaker to the Bonduel Bears.

Jerry Kranzush, who finished as the top pass receiver in the NEW, was named to the All-Conference squad as was defensive tackle Don Jochman. Ron Mueller was named to the second team.

Kranzush also received the most valuable and best defensive player awards, while guard Steve Rusch was selected as the most improved player.





Ron Mueller prepares to attack!




The 1966-67 varsity wrestling team will be remembered for a long time to come.

Around a solid nucleus of eight senior lettermen, Head Coach Dick Tepp and his assistant, Vern Anderson, molded a unit that established the finest record of any team in the six year history of the sport at SCHS and was feared and respected by every team in the area. When the season ended, the Indians had added five trophies to their collection, including their first Northeastern Wisconsin Conference tournament championship.

SCHS posted six straight dual meet wins before dropping their only loss of the season, 24-20, to Sturgeon Bay. The Indians also won first place in the Holiday Invitational tourney and the New London Invitational. They concluded dual meet competition with a 10-1 slate, downing their foes by an average score of 37-11.

The season reached its climax when the Indians bombed Pulaski 32-14 in a dual meet and two days later edged the arch-rival Raiders 91-90 in the NEW tourney for their first league title. The following week SCHS received its first rating in the "Sweet Sixteen" and ranked No. 11 in the final poll.


The Indians went on to win their ten-team regional tourney and advanced four champions — Dick Dunks, Dale Hodkiewicz, Ron Mueller, and Ken Nooyer to the sectionals. Dunks and Mueller won sectional crowns, and Hodkiewicz placed second to advance to Madison where each won a bout to register SCHS' first victories at 'State.'




