

#### ART

Art is offered to all students except freshmen. Basic fundamentals of observation are taught the first year. More difficult projects of oil painting, printmaking, and sculpture, the second year. Students in third year started new projects of experimenting with stained glass, the potter's wheel, and various fields of metals.

#### MUSIC

Chorus and band are offered to all students. The band used "Music Arts", a workbook which teaches the art of writing music. The students were encouraged to compose pieces for the band to play. The band also listened to works of great composers. The chorus received a choral appreciation text. Chart of rhythm patterns and composers' lives were used.

#### GUIDANCE

SCHS Guidance Center provides the student with the facilities to learn about the educational and job opportunities available to them after graduation. The guidance department invited representatives from area colleges to come with information of their school. Extensive information on vocational fields was also available for many commercial and vocational students.

#### HOME ECONOMIC

A new system was adopted in home economic this year which requires more thinking and participation on the part of the students. The new book, **The Developing Child**, utensils, and appliances were added. Miss Knipp, the student teacher helped out during the second quarter.

#### PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Instruction in gymnastics utilizing the new vaulting box and springboard were introduced. For the first time in several years the parallel bars, ropes, and rings were used by both boys and girls. The girls attempted a unit of interpretive dance.

#### AGRICULTURE

The farming program plays an important role in ag. This program was carried out by the individual student on his home farm or place of employment. It gave students practical experience in the field of agriculture that at times surpassed the class work.

#### **INDUSTRIAL ARTS**

A new program of joint exchange of students was developed. This exchange was between SCHS and Pulaski High. Offered for Senior boys only was a new metals class. New machines were also added to the classroom.

## Our high school education is but a brief

#### SCIENCE

An advanced Biology course was added to the list of Senior electives offered this year. Two new biology books were used in this class, the BSCS Blue Version and **Element's of Biology.** The **Plant Growth and Development** and **Animal Behavior** lab blocks were being used with the text. The addition of the Climaturium helped students set up controlled enviornmental center in which plants and animals can be observed.

Chemistry classes, an elective for Juniors and Seniors also had a new text, Modern Chemistry. The lab workbook supplemented the text.


The Physics department continued its experiment course in Nuclear Investigations. It was carried on through the cooperative efforts of the Atomic Energy commission, Montana State University and our school.

#### MATH

Math is offered all four years at SCHS. Freshmen are allowed to take either general math or algebra I. In turn the sophomores are encouraged to take Modern Geometry but it is also an elective for Juniors and Seniors. For Seniors interested in additional math courses Trigonometry and Advanced Math are offered. Some interested students in the latter course attended a lecture on mathematics dealing with the computer.

#### COMMERCIAL

The adoption of new procedures and equipment helped students in the commercial department train for business careers. A complete preparatory program was offered to business students with a capstone course for seniors, making it possible for them to graduate fully trained for a job. Students worked mainly from three text—**Understanding Modern Business, Data Processing,** and **Business Data Processing**—and made use of the key punch and card sorting machines which were in their first full years of use. In addition, students were able to work in two hour blocks, improving their concentration.



#### LIBRARY

Many new books were added to the library in various fields. A very important addition to the library was Mrs. Jenkins part-time secretary. For the first year, an Honors Reading group was started. It was made up of voluntary students coming from the Junior and Senior classes. A novel a month was the required reading. An informal group discussion of the novel was the function of the meeting.

#### SOCIAL SCIENCE

The essence of schooling is to equip students to live and prosper in the outside world. Five courses of social sciences are offered in the school's curriculum, including Civics, World History, U.S. History, Geography, and American Problems.

#### LANGUAGE

This year, a twenty four unit language lab was added for the use of the French classes. The lab includes a stereo console with record player and tape recordings. This unit increases the oral aspect of the language and allows for individual progress since several different tapes can be played simultaneously. The teacher operates the console, and can speak to individual students as well as to the class as a whole, thus increasing, the amount of direct individual counselling available to each student. This is not posssible in an ordinary class situation.

#### ENGLISH

Four new courses were added to the English Department curriculum this year. The class which was formerly Speech and Advance Composition was split into two separate courses. Speech, for Juniors and Seniors, was a one semester course. Another Junior-Senior class Advanced Composition experimented with the new SRA transparencies, to help clarify and illustrate basic concepts. Another new course, Practical Communications, concentrated on the fine points of grammer and usage. Also offered for the first time was Remedial Reading for many English classes used a Readers Digest supplement and a weekly magazine entitled Scope.



Suzi Reichenpfader, Seymour's fifth foreign exchange student arrived in Seymour on August 7, 1967. While in Seymour, Suzi, an only child, made her home with Dr. and Mrs. N. E. Heike, their four daughters and one son. Suzi's family in Vienna had previously hosted an exchange student from New York.

Suzi considered school in Austria more difficult than school in the United States. In addition to subjects such as history and math, there Suzi was required to study philosophy, psychology, and six languages including Greek, Latin, German, English, French, and Italian.

At SCHS Suzi's classes included U. S. History, shorthand, American problems, English, Mixed Chorus and physical education. She was an honorary member of all clubs and took an active part in them, including a part as a dancer in the operetta. She spent several week-



With half the victory won, it was with much anticipation that we started to gain the other half which will be the realization of many dreams.



The class was very active all year in extracurricular activities. Notable of these were the operetta, band concerts, and football, basketball, track and baseball.




### FFA





Rival Pulaski posed the final opposition of the season. Dominating statistics, the Indians squeezed by the Red Raiders.


Both the coaches and the players gave tremendous effort and time to make this season a successful one. As the season progressed, the team became one to reckon with and came through with commendable results.






## Varsity displayed a new team drive to win









The undeveloped men of last year's team will be back this year to put our '68 team out in front to keep a winning tradition in the sport of track at Seymour High.


### **CROSS-Country**

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
