## BUSINESS

This year, included in the complete prepatory program for seniors was the Data Processing van. The van was shared by four schools; each school having the use of the unit for nine weeks. The Data Processing van provided training at a more realistic cost and a more individual type of training was offered for students were able to learn how to operate such machines as; key punch, IBM selectric, card sorter, varifier, and accounting machine. Through this capstone course, business students are beginning to gain a better understanding of Data Processing and its effect on industry.

ART

Art is offered to all students except freshmen. During the first year, fundamentals of drawing and design are taught. Also, print-making, sculpture, lettering, and commercial art are introduced. Second year students begin oil painting, advanced drawing and print-making, water color, sculpture, and ink studies. Students in third year start new projects experimenting with the potter's wheel, silk screening, sterling silver jewelry, and home design.

## MUSIC

Due to increase in the number of band members, the band was split into two separate hours, two separate bands - the Crimson Blazer Band, and the Red Arrow Band.

New to SCHS this year is a Music theory course, offered to all band and chorus members. This course, is conducted during the student's free time by using a text, workbook, and
a selection of records. After the completion of this course, the student should understand basic principles of music theory and be able to apply them.

Several of the Students participated in the Operation: Area Arts stringed-instrument program. The violin, cello and the stringed-instrument program was well received.

## LIBRARY

This year many new books pertaining to the new English Courses have been added to the vast number of books contained in the school library.

Our library has an outstanding reference section, and a list of all reference materials is available to the students.

## MATHEMATICS

New courses in Computer Mathematics and in probability and Statistics will be offered in the near future along with the new courses already available in mathematics.

## SCIENCE

A new Biology program was instituted this year in the Science Department. The Sopho-
mores meet for one hour of long session a week for lectures, three hours of short session a week for discussion, and one hour a week for individual lab work. The Advanced Biology students meet three hours a week for class work and have two hours a week for lab work. This program emphasizes individual work on the Student's part.

To keep with the advancing frontiers of science, new physics textbooks and workbooks were made available to the Senior Physics classes.

## SOCIAL SCIENCE

This year in the Social Studies Department a Freshman Civics class has been experimenting with a new book, COMPARATIVE POLITICAL

SYSTEMS, AN INQUIRY APPROACH. Previous to this class Civics in SCHS has been reading a textbook in which items were arranged under subtitles in chronological order, examining pictures, graphs, tables, and charts, and memorizing important items. However this new textbook and other audio-visual aids such as filmstrips, recordings, and transparencies for an overhead projector, help the students to identify problems, develop answers to these problems, and draw their own conclusions.
