Planning was completed for a new Friday TV series on guidance counseling with special information for parents. With Mr. Anderson advising grades 8 and 9, Mr. Herbst aiding grades 8 and 11, not forgetting Miss Severson directing grades 10 and 12, all students were easily able to obtain help.

LANGUAGE ARTS

The Language Arts Department changed its

Junior and Senior curriculum to include a series of one-semester courses. This change was made to permit the student to choose a field of interest in English and to go into depths in exploring that field. The system also allows the teachers to specialize in their particular field of interest.

The courses include several previously instated courses such as the Novel class, Speech class, and Advanced Composition. Added to these were American Literature, British Literature, Business English, and Techniques in Communication.

Teachers interchanged classes to provide variety, and specialized instruction.

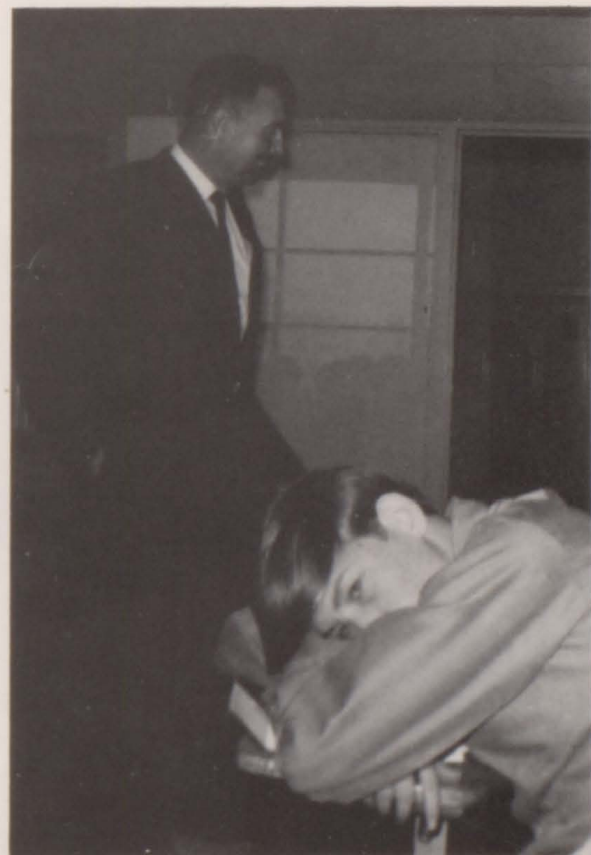

Goals of These Departments

BUSINESS

This year, included in the complete preparatory program for seniors was the Data Processing van. The van was shared by four schools; each school having the use of the unit for nine weeks. The Data Processing van provided training at a more realistic cost and a more individual type of training was offered for students were able to learn how to operate such machines as; key punch, IBM selectric, card sorter, varifier, and accounting machine. Through this capstone course, business students are beginning to gain a better understanding of Data Processing and its effect on industry.

ART

Art is offered to all students except freshmen. During the first year, fundamentals of drawing and design are taught. Also, print-making, sculpture, lettering, and commercial art are introduced. Second year students begin oil painting, advanced drawing and print-making, water color, sculpture, and ink studies. Students in third year start new projects experimenting with the potter's wheel, silk screening, sterling silver jewelry, and home design.

MUSIC

Due to increase in the number of band members, the band was split into two separate hours, two separate bands — the Crimson Blazer Band, and the Red Arrow Band.

New to SCHS this year is a Music theory course, offered to all band and chorus members. This course, is conducted during the student's free time by using a text, workbook, and

a selection of records. After the completion of this course, the student should understand basic principles of music theory and be able to apply them.

Several of the Students participated in the Operation: Area Arts stringed-instrument program. The violin, cello and the stringed-instrument program was well received.

LIBRARY

This year many new books pertaining to the new English Courses have been added to the vast number of books contained in the school library.

Our library has an outstanding reference section, and a list of all reference materials is available to the students.

SCHS can be proud of its outstanding library, which is run efficiently under Mrs. Jenkin's direction.

New courses in Computer Mathematics and in probability and Statistics will be offered in the near future along with the new courses already available in mathematics.

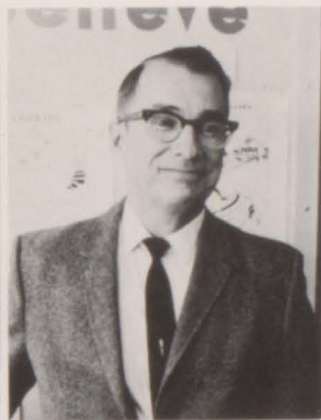
These new courses will keep our fine math department in step with our rapidly changing environment. The needs of the students are in mind in the Mathematics Department.

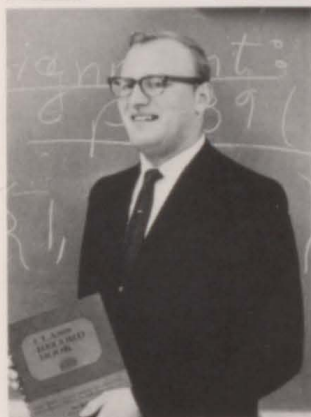
To keep with the advancing frontiers of science, new physics textbooks and workbooks were made available to the Senior Physics classes.

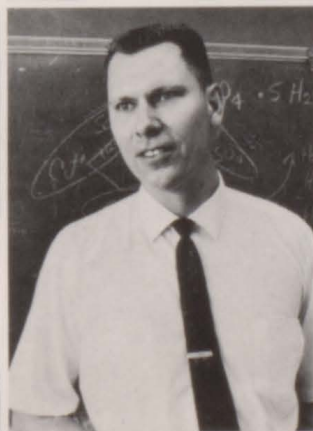
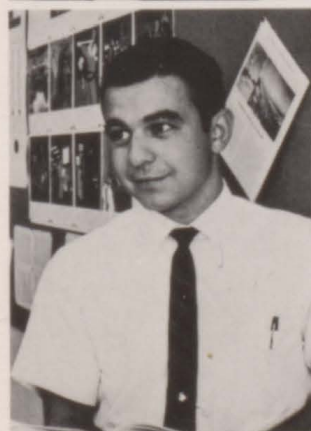

Until the space is available; shop classes, drafting classes, power mechanics classes, and electricity classes are offering the best they can.

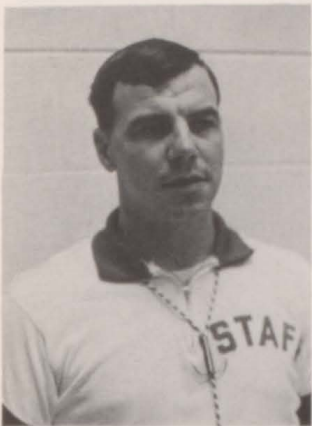
HOME ECONOMICS

This year in the Social Studies Department a Freshman Civics class has been experimenting with a new book, **COMPARATIVE POLITICAL**

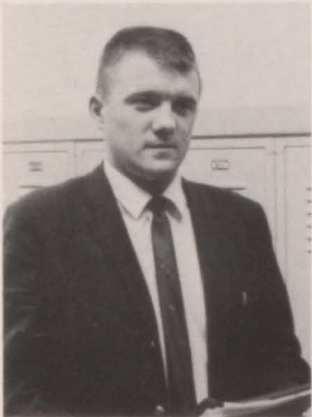

However this new textbook and other audio-visual aids such as filmstrips, recordings, and transparencies for an overhead projector, help the students to identify problems, develop answers to these problems, and draw their own conclusions. 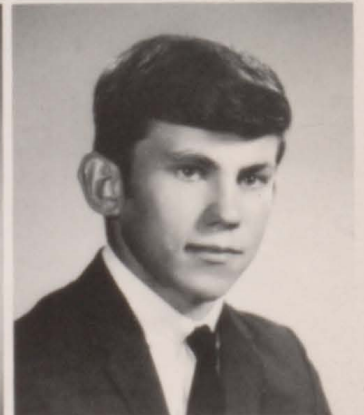
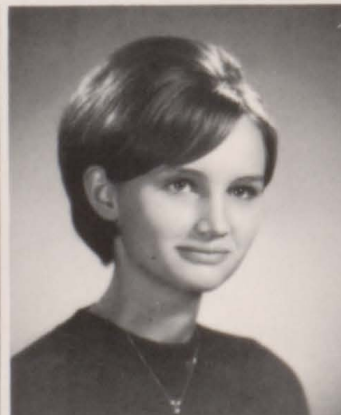
Actually, we did not study very much, but seemed to spend most of our time in the Guidance Center planning our futures . . . choosing a school, a job, the Service, or even marriage.

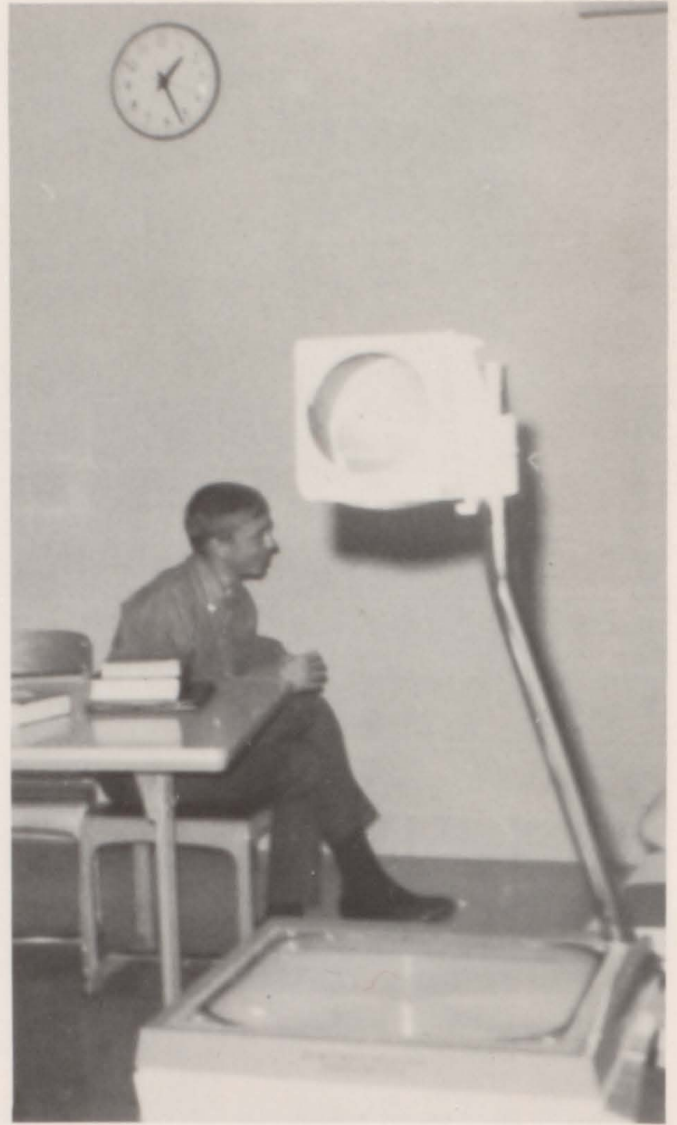

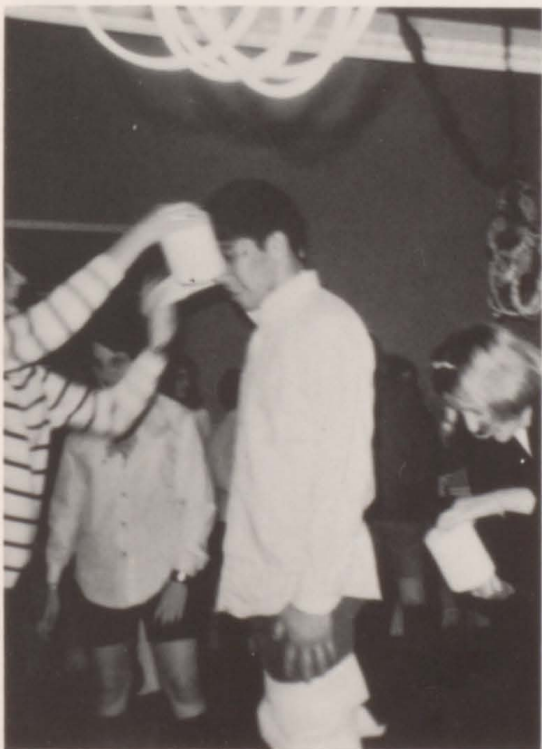

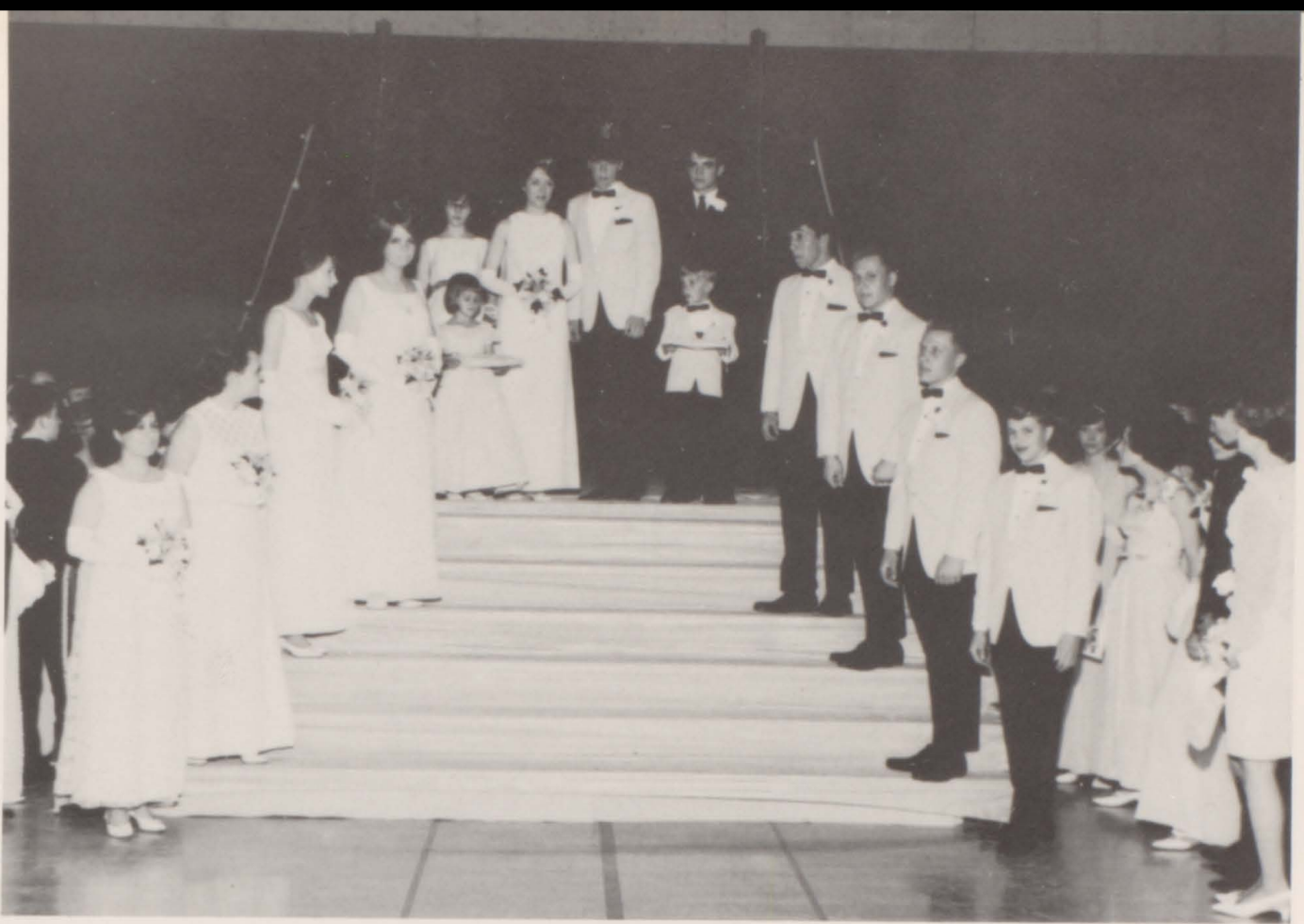

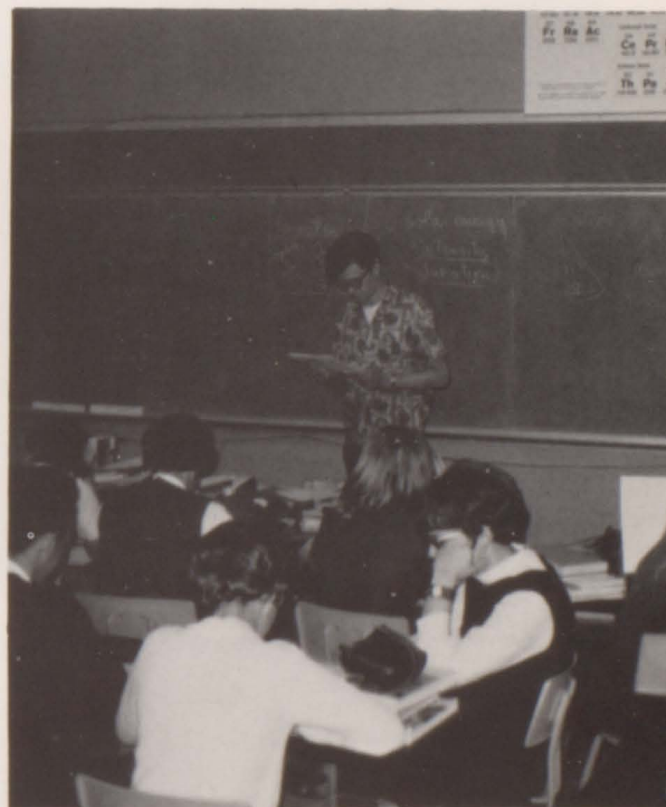

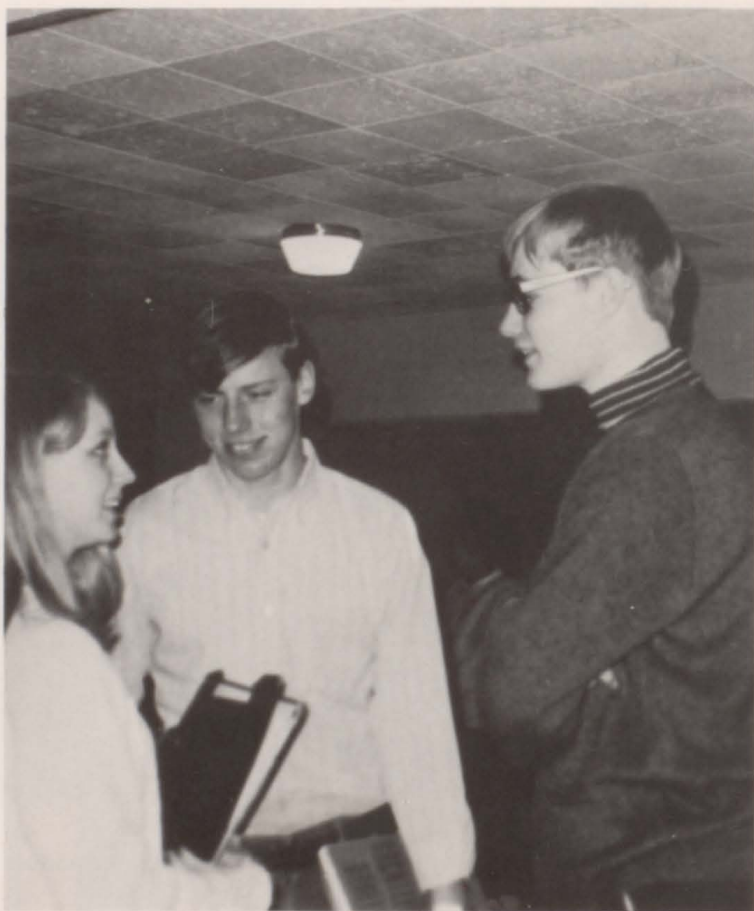

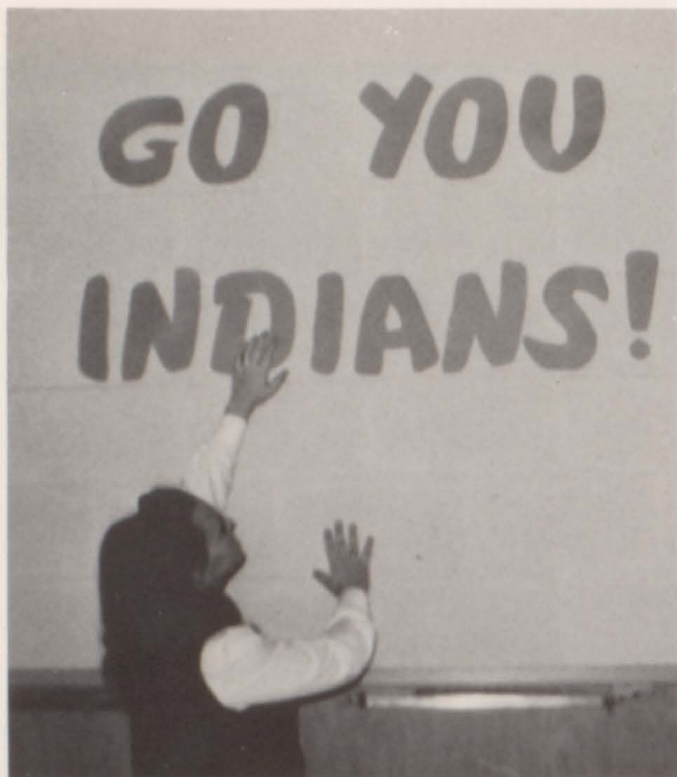

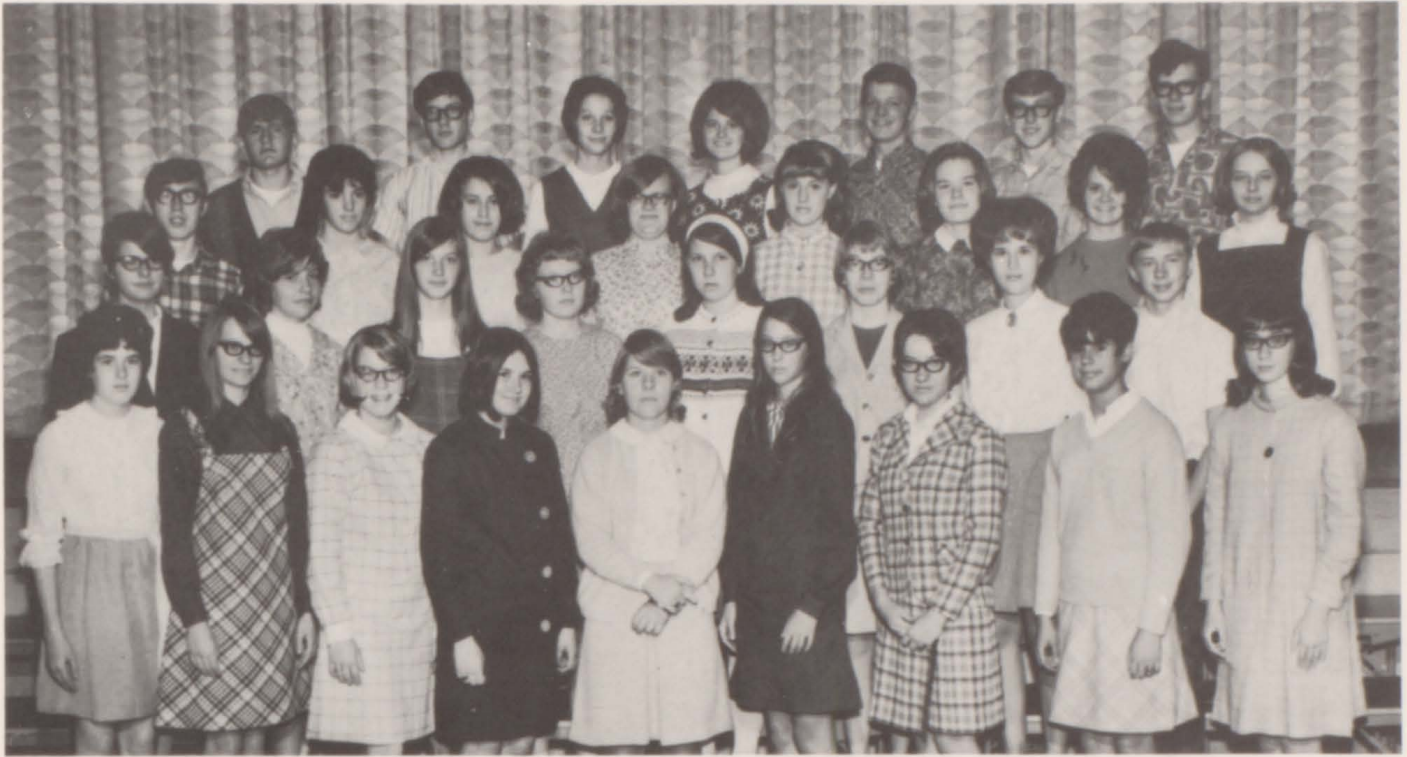

With the abundance of snow this year, the Ars Nova members attempted snow and ice sculptures.

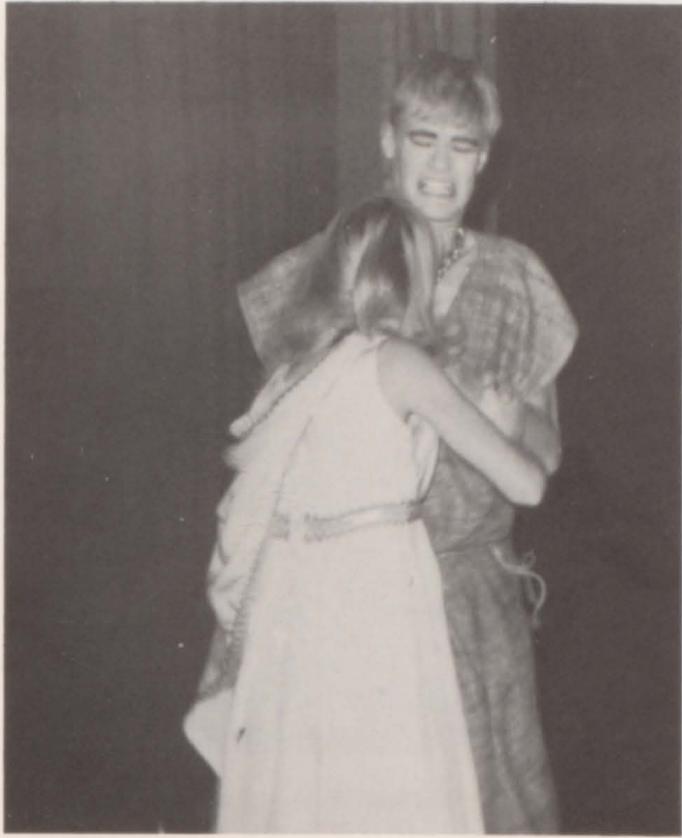
Spring brought a trip to the Art Institute in Chicago and the annual Art Fair. The fair again provided art students with an opportunity to publicly display their art work.

An old model threshing machine with the slogan "We'll Thresh Out A Victory" was the FFA's entry in the Homecoming parade.

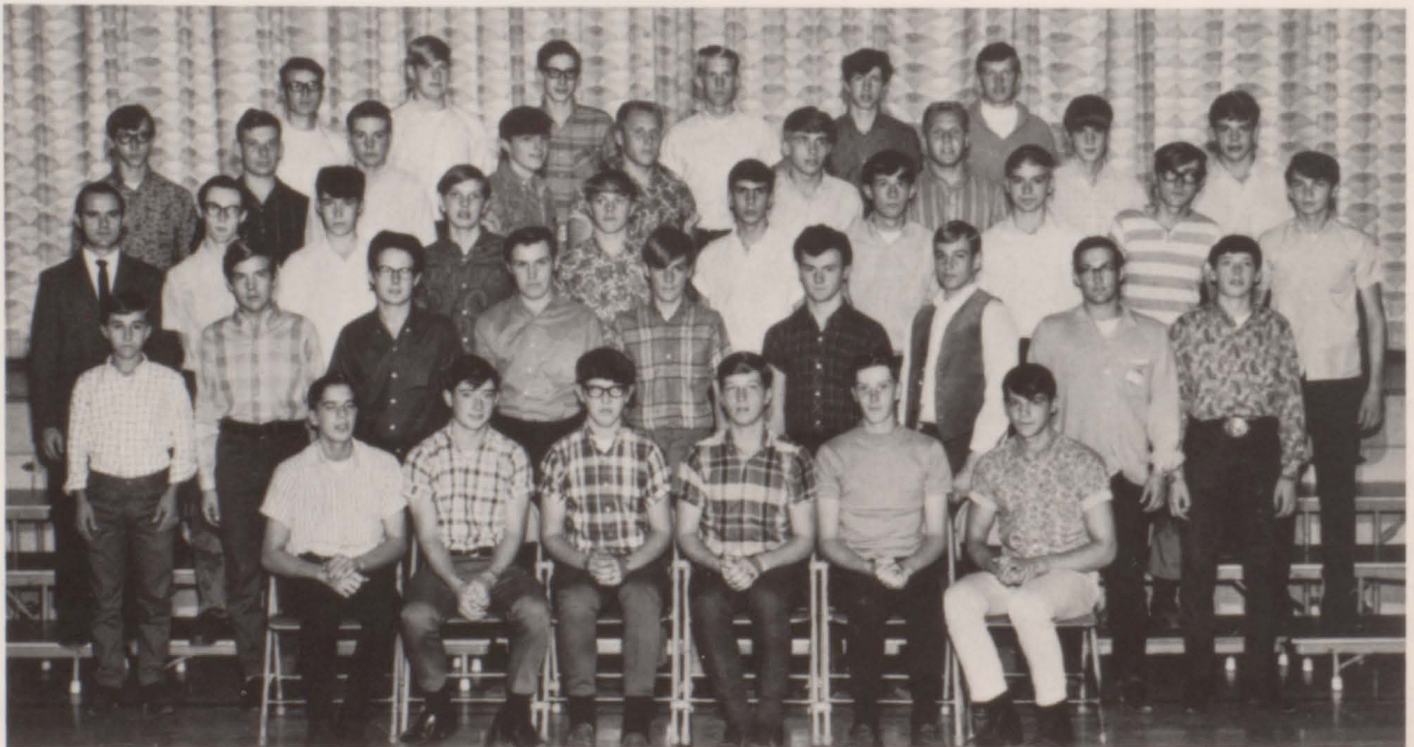

Selling candy in a contest with the FHA and selling magazines were projects undertaken for club support. Club members also sold rat bait as part of an anti-rat campaign.

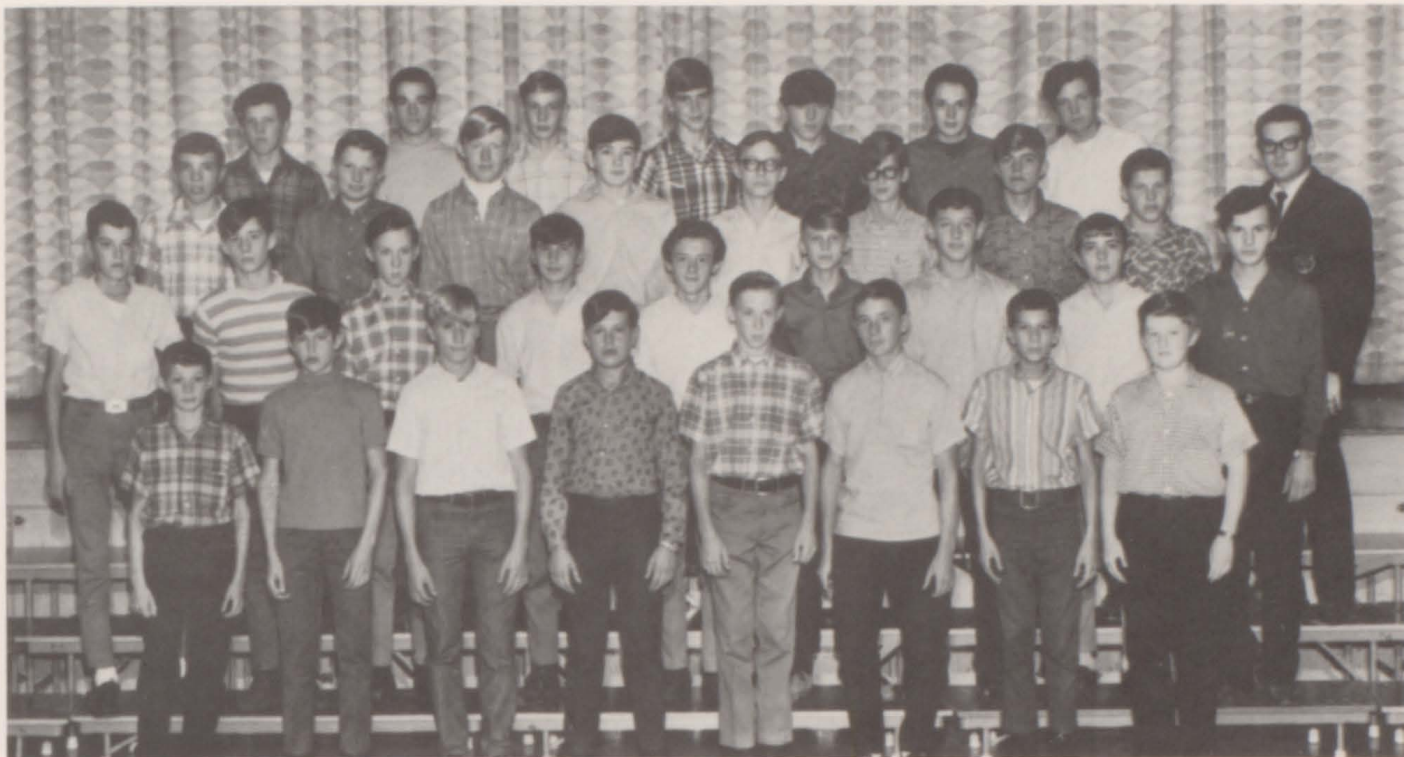

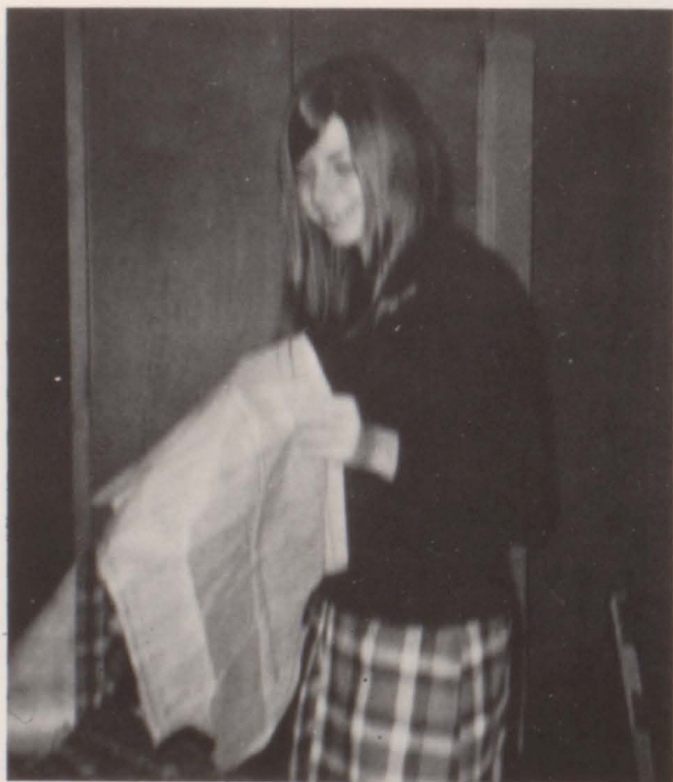

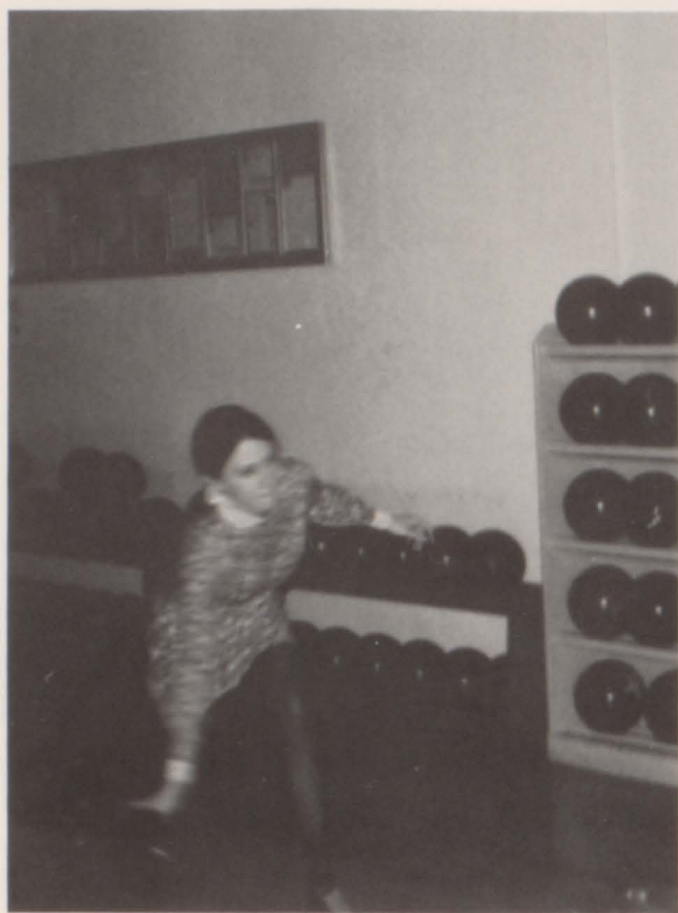

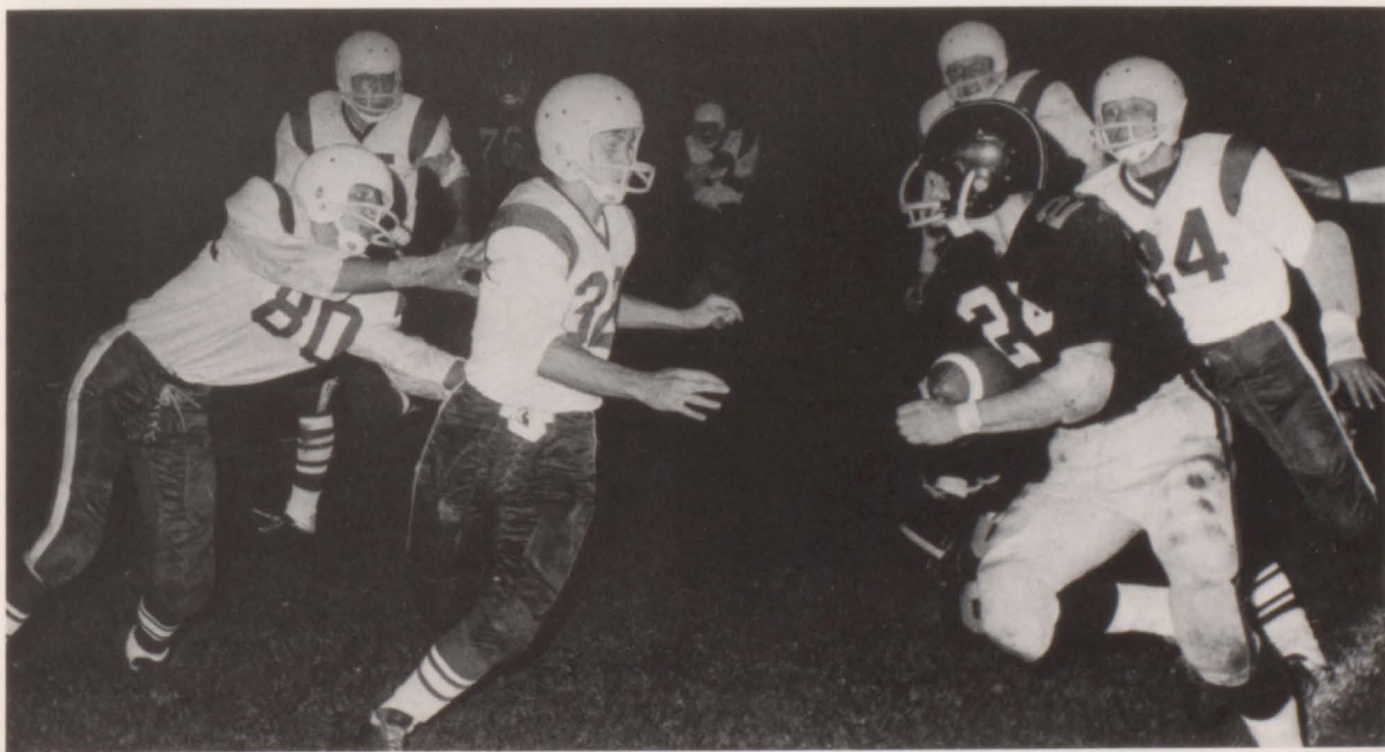

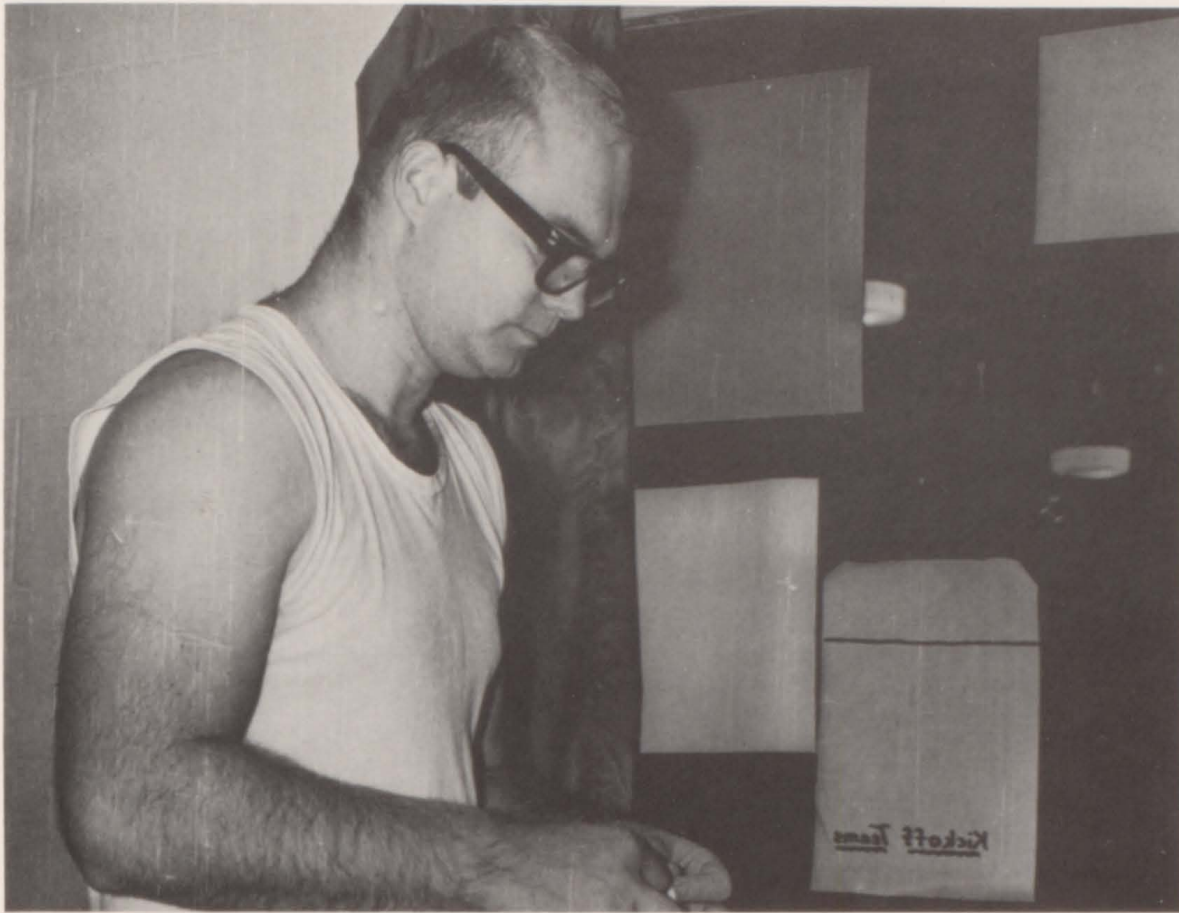

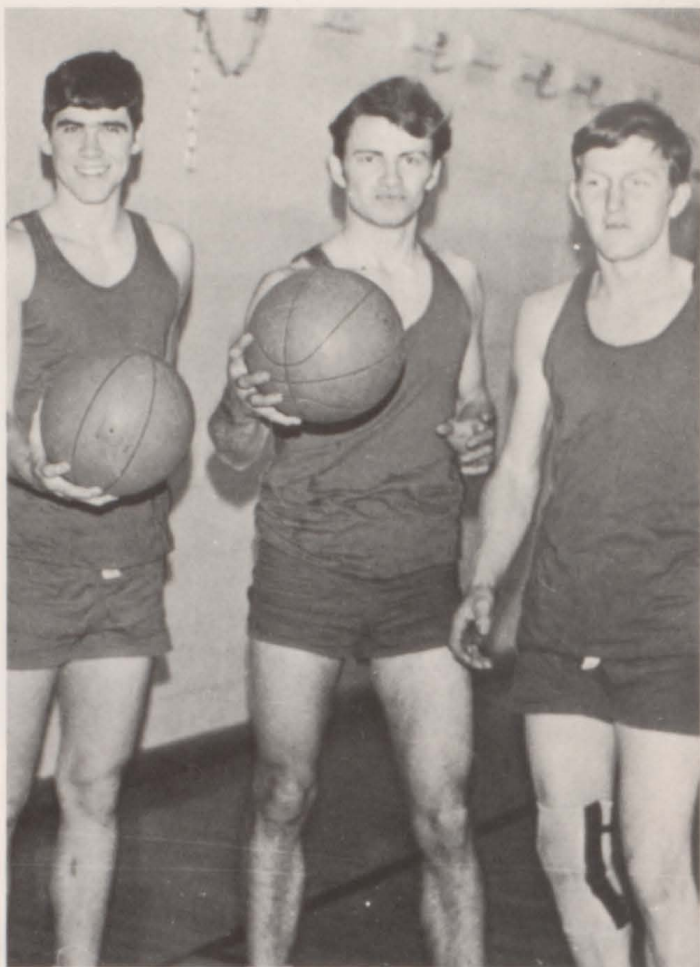

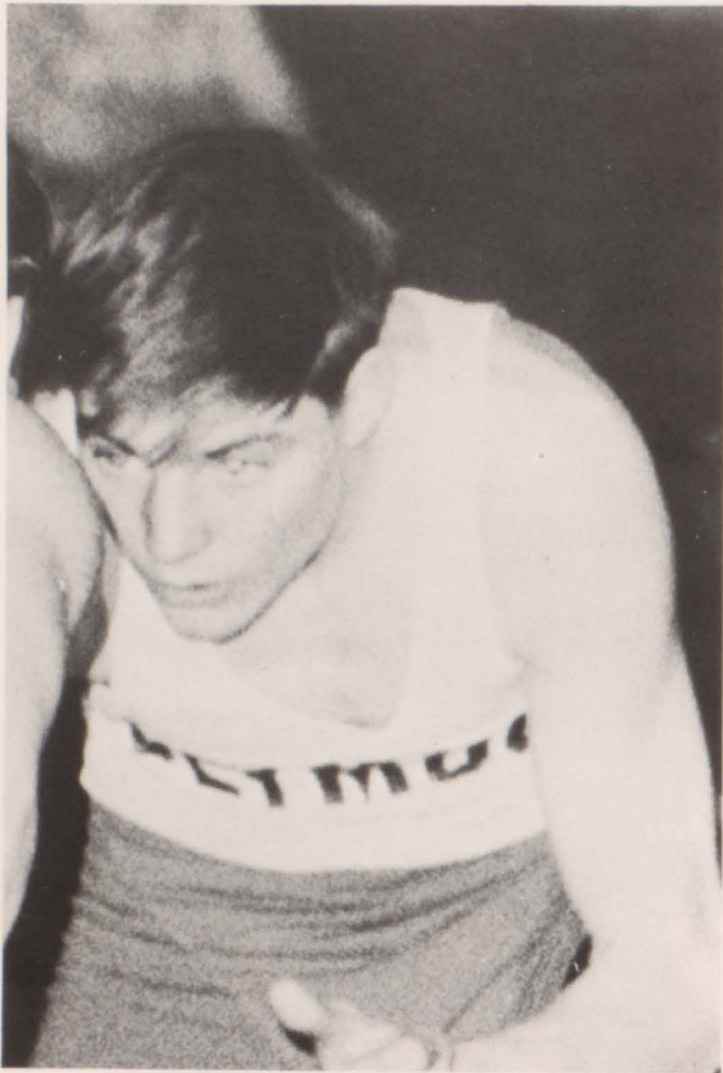

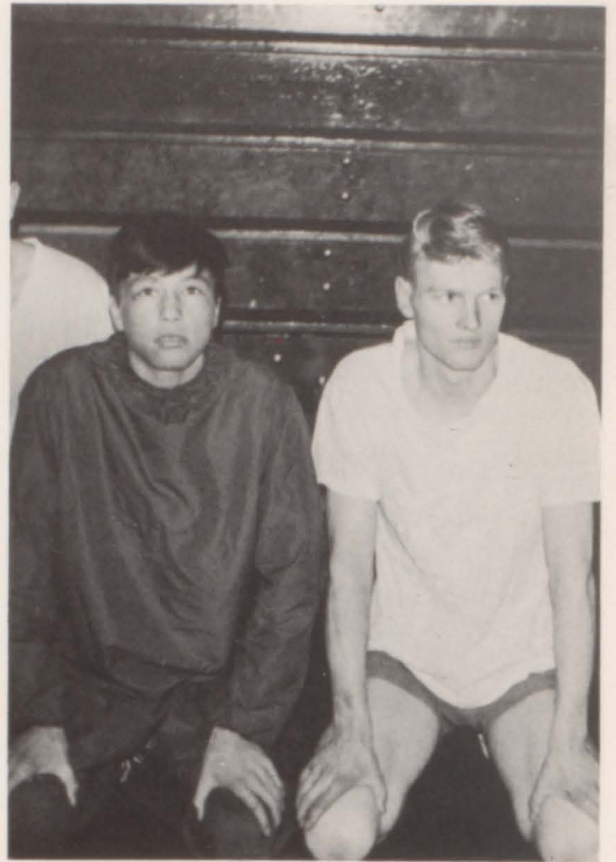

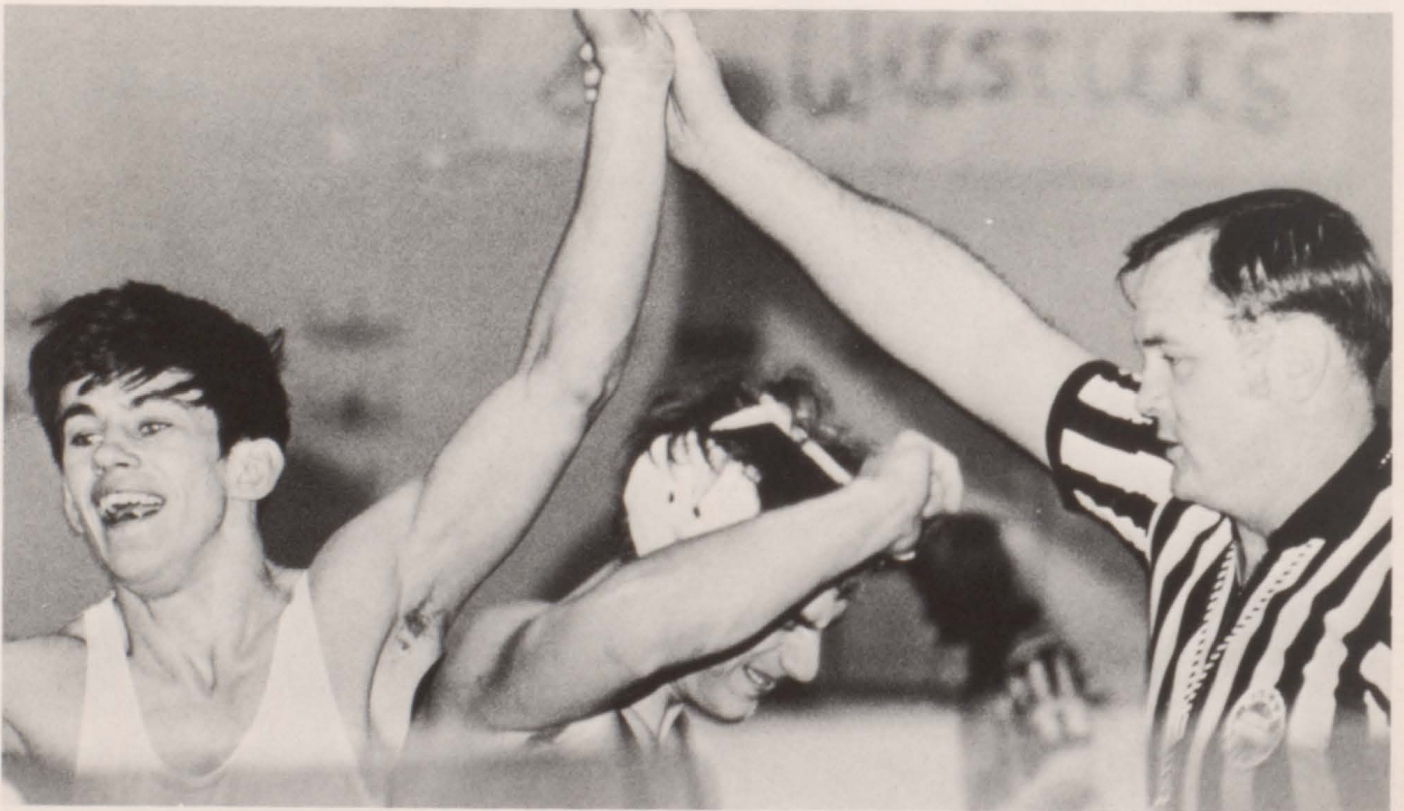

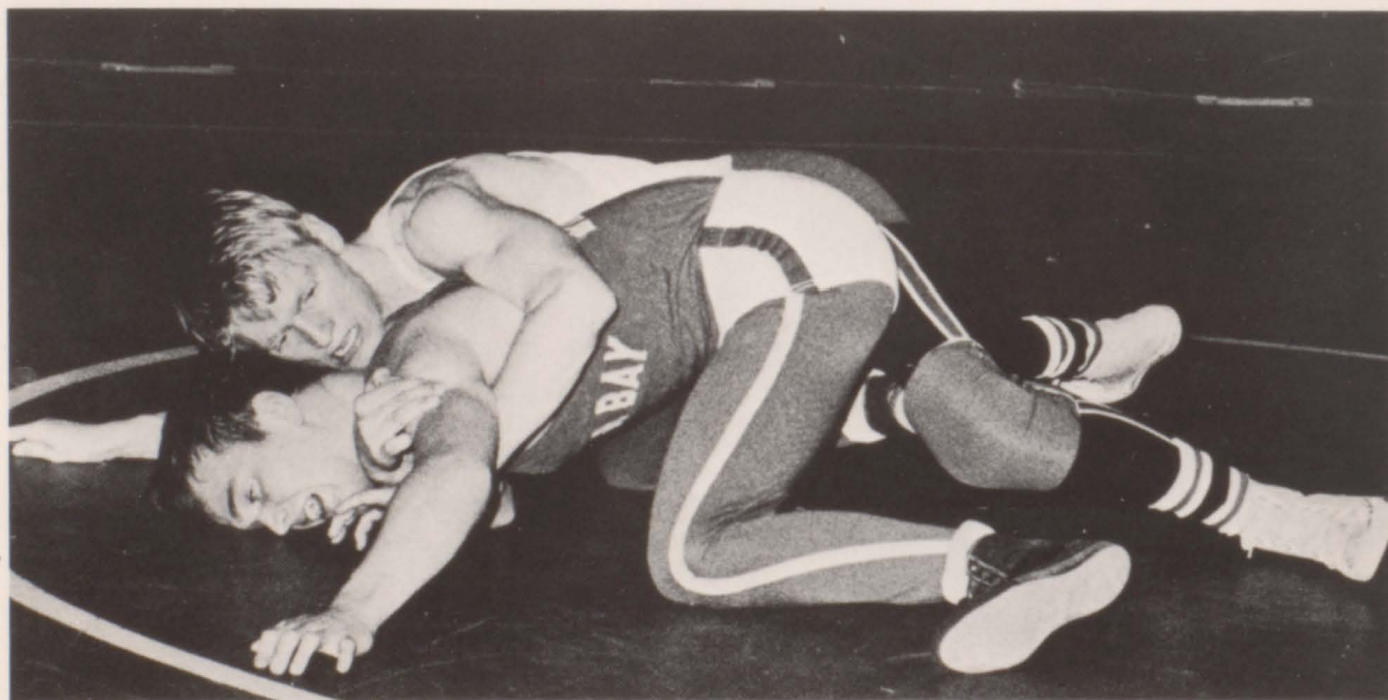

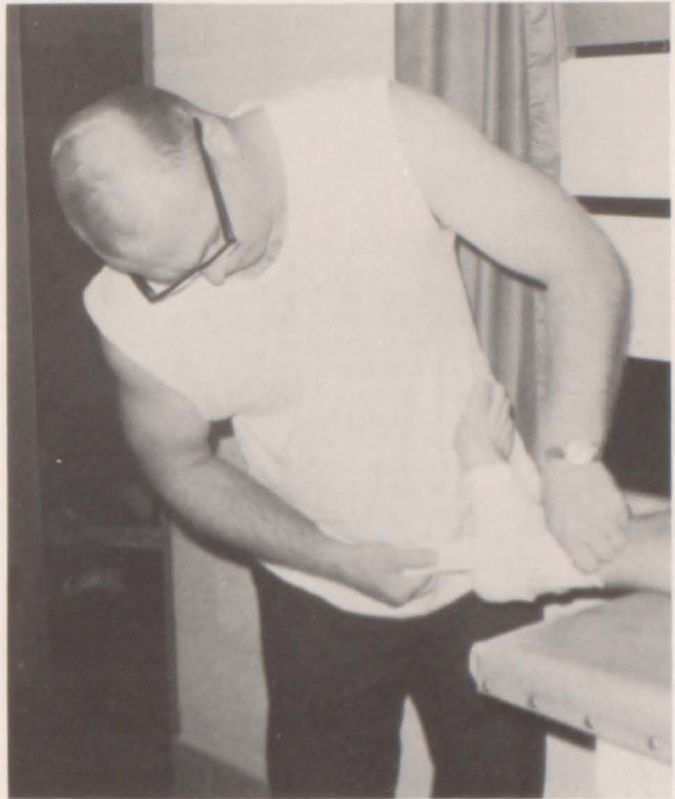
The cheerleaders were active in pep assemblies and skits during the course of the year, and with their many new cheers inspired much student enthusiasm.

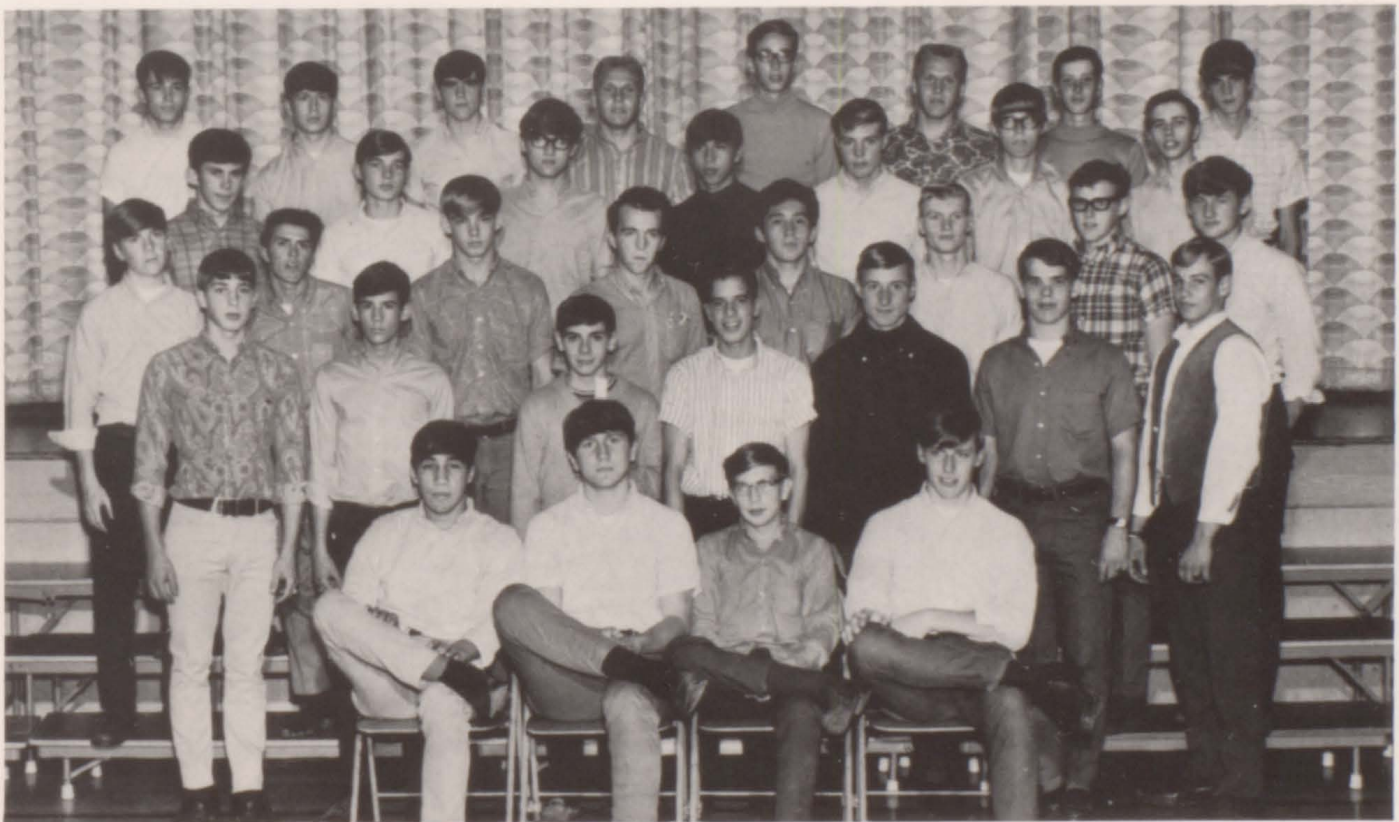
