


Three new members have been added to the teaching staff — Mr. Land, Mr. Burmeister, and Mr. Wittek.



Representing the Juniors on the Homecoming court were Terry Berken and Debbie Katch.




#### Sophomores Challenge New Ideas at SCHS










# Season Was a Big Disappointment For Coach














