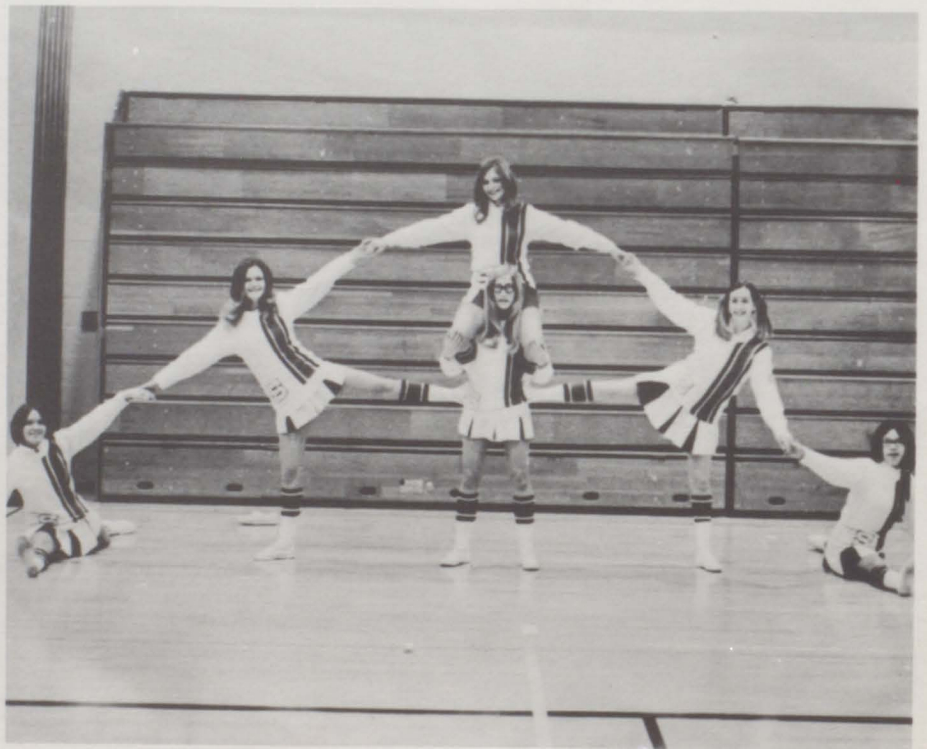

# Staff Dedicates Itself to Hard Work

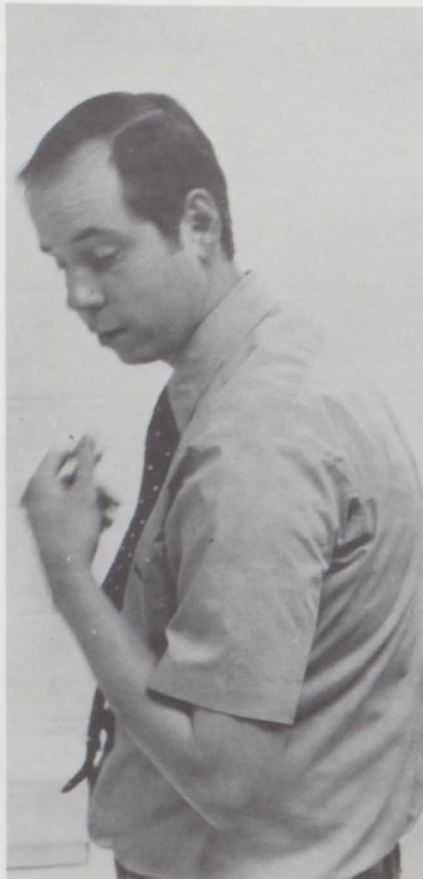

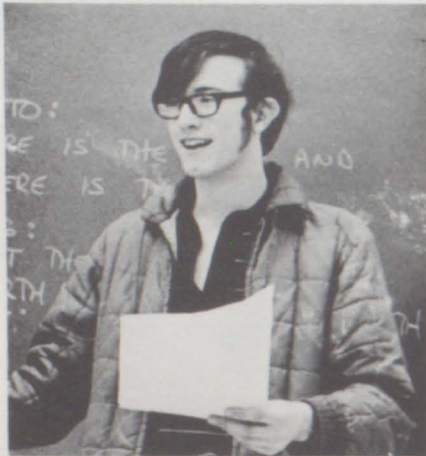


# Arguing, What It's All About

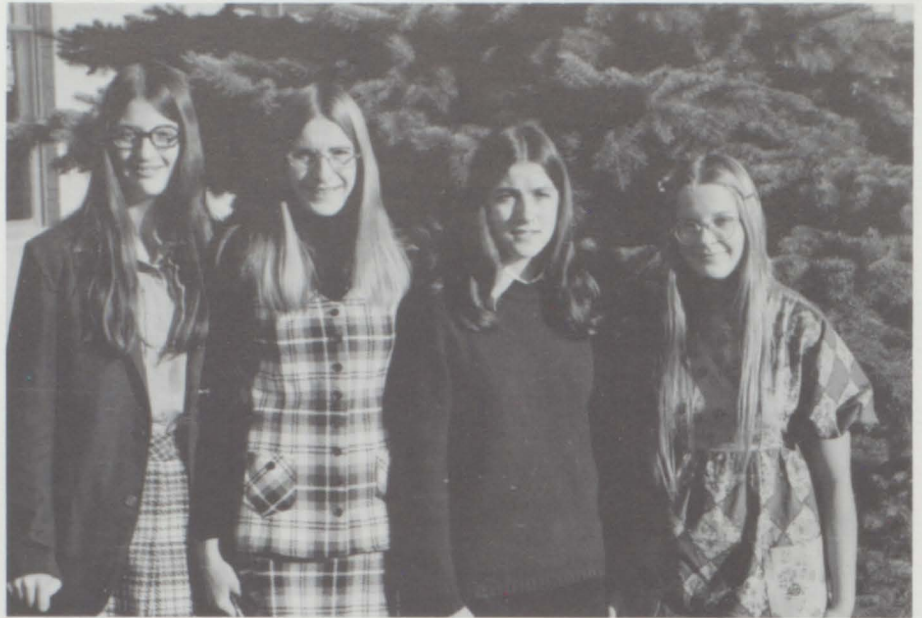
# Anxious Sophomores Receive New Experiences

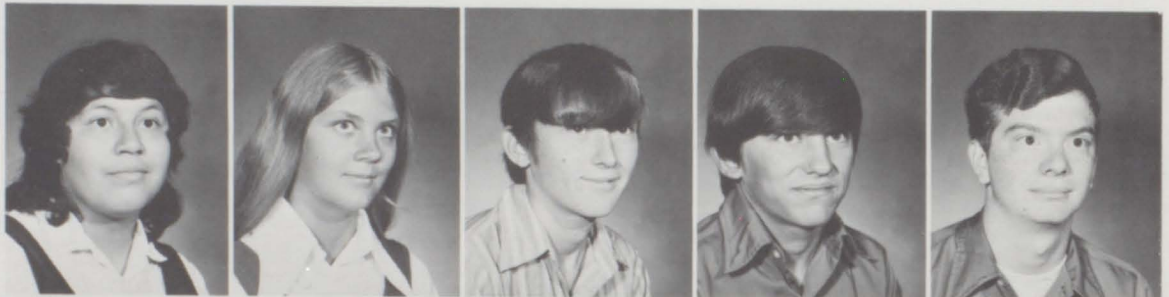
# Today We Follow, Tomorrow We Lead

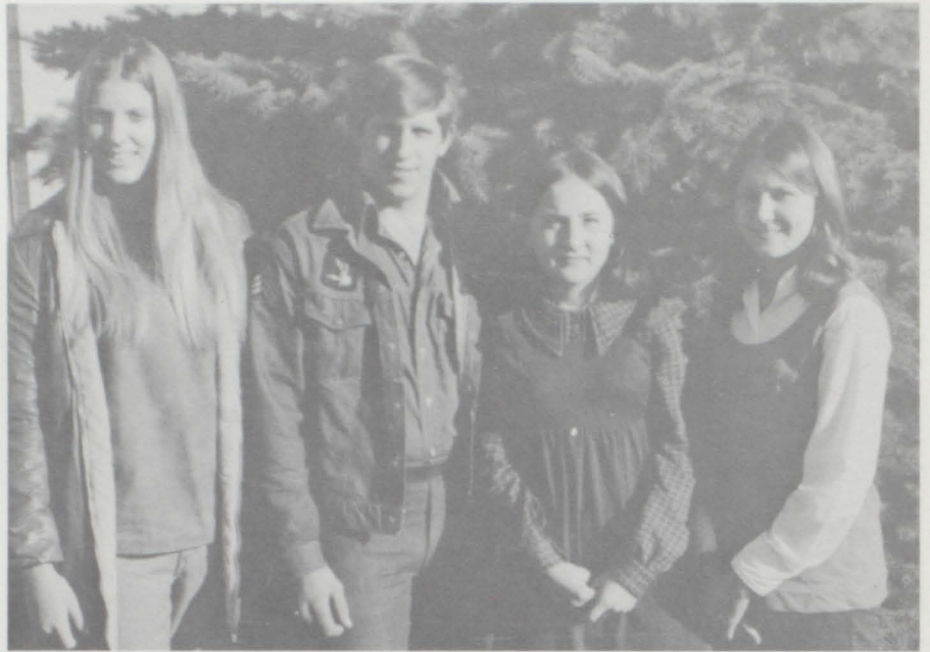


# Our Senior Year . . . The End of The Beginning
