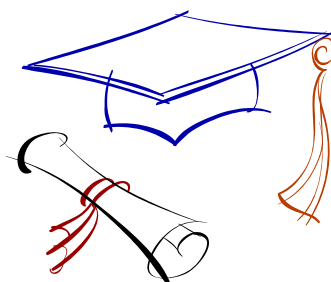

Seymour High School Graduation Ceremonies Sunday, June 3 High School Field House 2:00 p.m.

Students and their families have prepared for high school graduation for many years. The following guidelines have been established so students in the Class of 2012 may be recognized with dignity and respect.



- All 2012 graduates are to attend graduation practice on Friday, June 1, at 10:00 a.m. in the field house.
- A dress code is in effect for the graduates:

For male graduates: dress pants, shirt and tie, and dress shoes.

For female graduates: appropriate dresses or dress pants and shirt, and dress shoes.

- So families and friends can enjoy the ceremony with minimal distraction, a professional photograph of individual students receiving their diploma will be available to each graduate.
- Guests will be admitted to the field house by ticket only. Each graduate will receive 10 tickets for family and friends. If unused tickets are available, they will be distributed to graduates who register a need in the student services office prior to graduation practice.
- Graduates are expected to obey and respect all school rules. Violations of school rules will result in exclusion from the commencement ceremony and may require graduates to pick up their diploma from school officials at a designated meeting.
- Make sure applause for your graduate does not interfere with the reading of the following graduate's name during the diploma portion of the ceremony.

We use our census lists to contact families who may be eligible for Early Childhood programs and also for four-year old and five-year old Kindergarten screenings. If you are not sure if you are listed on our census, you may contact Marilyn and she can confirm your information. All children between the ages of new born through 20 years of age are counted on our census.

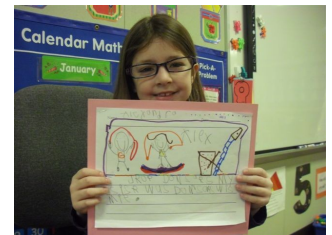

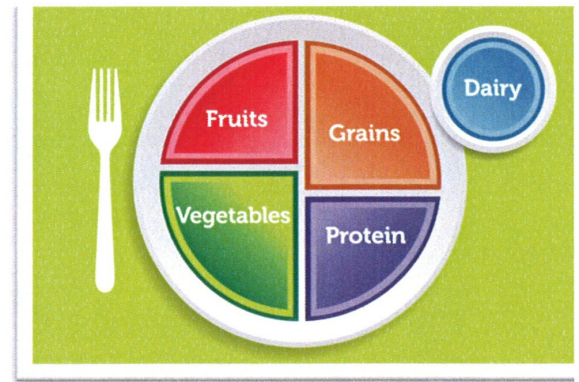

But How can I know what the right portion is?

- A potato should be the size of a computer mouse.
- A ½ (HALF) cup serving is about the size of a light bulb!
- A 3 ounce serving of lean meat is the size of a deck of cards
- A 3 ounce serving of fish is the size of a checkbook
- A 1 ounce serving of lunch meat is the size of a compact disc (CD)
- A 1 cup serving of cereal, pasta, popcorn is the size of a baseball

Although the 2012 maple syrup season was short-lived, Seymour Alternative High School students had a sweet taste of it. Students Jade Wendt and Matt Skenandore, along with teacher Jon Murphy, tapped about seventeen maple trees at Fallen Timbers Environmental Center. They collected sap in five-gallon pails, filtered the sap, and cooked it down to syrup. Unfortunately, warm March temperatures slowed the flow of sap to just over a week. One-hundred-forty gallons of sap were collected, which netted three and a half gallons of syrup.

The use of *Seymour-Live*, SCHS's own domain and URL shared with Google, will assist students in becoming more literate with technology and its uses for jobs and post-secondary education.
