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Celebrating Reading at Black Creek School

Each quarter at Black Creek Elementary/Middle School, the students in kindergarten, first, and second grade are rewarded for their efforts in reading. A morning is set aside for the children to partake in four different activities. The theme for the second quarter reward day was moose.

Mrs. Kaphingst, Black Creek School's principal, read the story Morris the Moose. In this silly selection, Morris along with other animals, confuses his identity as a moose. It isn't until the animals look at their reflection in the water that they see they truly are different from one another and unique in animal type. The children were rolling with laughter over the number of misunderstandings made by Morris. As a response to the story, Mrs. Kaphingst helped the children mix together what she called "Moose Munch", a delicious trail mix treat.

Interesting facts and items were shared by Mrs. Mathe from Fallen Timbers. Some of the items that she displayed were a moose antler, moose hoof print, elk skin, and photos of predators to the moose. The children were fascinated to learn that moose hold grizzly bears under water to drown them and that moose are five times larger than deer. Mrs. Mathe even allowed the children to lift the moose antler to see just how heavy it was.

Ms. Bidwell, the literacy coordinator at Black Creek School, read a story called <u>Mooseprints</u>. In the story, Moosling is confused by the footprints he sees in the woods and tries to discover who they be-

long to. After the story, the children had fun testing their knowledge of fun moose facts by answering true or false questions and playing "Moose Says". The children learned that moose are part of the deer family, travel in herds, eat plants, and can give birth to twins.

The children were excited to have a parent of one of their class-



mates join them for this activity. Mr. Cegielski, Ben's father, shared his vast knowledge of moose. With his experience from working with the All Canada Show, Mr. Cegielski was able to answer many of the questions raised by the children. He had the children practicing the calls of a female and male moose, demonstrated that the moose do not have good eyesight by having the children place their hands over their eyes with spread fingers, and used a mounted moose to point out the special features of the moose: points, spread, length of nose, and bell.

With the start of 2010, LMA has continued to be very productive. The new year continued with the children working on literacy activities with letters, which they have now finished. They are now working on recognition of their last names and naming those letters. We are concentrating on letter sounds throughout the balance of the school year. In math the children are beginning to work on transition of numbers from 9 to 10, 19 to 20, 29 to 30 and so on. They count 1 -100, and also by 5's and 10's. Math concepts with patterns of AABB and ABC, along with getting a visual on sink or float, magnets, measurements, and weights.

The children worked with mixing of the primary colors to see what colors prior to dyeing Easter

eggs. They will to do several projects a week like working on gardening and planting of seeds. They are learning to gallop and skip for large motor skills.

The children were excited with their field trip to the Building 4 Kids and look forward to their trip at the end of the school year. They enjoyed many parent planned activities like the nutrition event and the family movie night.





Head Start/4K Children are Preparing for Their Future!

What does it mean to be educated in the 21st century? That is the topic David Warlick spoke about last fall when addressing teachers and staff of the Seymour School District. David's presentation on "creating a new vision for the classroom that's changing our definitions of teaching, learning and being educated in the 21st Century" was gripping. He talked about 'digital learners', something many of us have yet to understand as we grapple with our Smart phones and iPods.

Sony recently showed a video to all its employees where statistic after statistic shows we are living in exponential times. We, parents and educators, are currently "preparing students for jobs that do not yet exist...using technologies that haven't been invented...in order to solve problems we don't even know are problems yet."

So how do we design learning environments for this generation of children? What equipment do we purchase for the youngest of our learners? These questions was posed to the Seymour Head Start 4K teacher, Debbie Roche. Her answer, an interactive white board.

After listening to David Warlick's presentation titled "Literacy in the 21st Century", we were convinced that we needed to do more to adequately prepare young children for their future. An interactive white board sounded like a good start. I began my research on the internet (of course!) and found a wide variety of such boards available. I then wondered if other early childhood programs had been using these "Smart boards" in their classrooms. After all, we know blocks, sensory tables and paper/crayons are the things early childhood is made of. Why expose them to technology at such a young age...I think David Warlick and Sony can answer that.

I sent out a 'call' (where else than on Facebook) asking my friends and family if they had heard of any early childhood classrooms who were using Smart boards. It turns out, not many. As I continued to talk to early childhood professionals, many felt that children will get exposed to such technology soon enough. We should allow them to be children. To play in the sandbox and have carefree days!

I was in a quandary. My expertise in early childhood development told me that yes, children needed to play with sand and blocks and read books! But emerging technology is saying we're not preparing our children for a future they will be living in. So how do I meet *all* the needs of young children? I continued to talk with people, do my research and eventually...

Seymour Head Start purchased an Eno board, Polyvision's version of a Smart board. It is a 3-in-1 board: dry erase, magnetic, and interactive. It also allows 3 children to write on it at once. How is this cutting edge equipment used in the classroom you wonder?

- name writing: which is developmentally appropriate (much like an easel) so children of all abilities can come up to the board and write their name as large or small as they are able
- matching games: children can match opposites, colors, numbers/dots, etc using the stylus pen (much like a mouse...not the squeaky kind).
- dancing: there a variety of videos available on the internet where children can dance along with the children on the 6 foot screen
- reading: Tumble books is a program Muehl public library has available on its website where children can read along
- patterning: children can manipulate to create unique patterns

The children's reaction is much as I expected... they are curious, no-fear experimenters! Unlike most adults, children are not afraid of technology. They embrace it as easily as they embrace blocks or sand. "I love Eno" one child said to me, "it's the coolest thing ever!" And they don't even realize they're learning.

What's next for Seymour Head Start? We're looking into a Flip camera!



Rock Ledge Discovery Garden

Last spring the Discovery Garden was created between Rock Ledge Intermediate and Rock Ledge Primary Center. It is located in the courtyard (surrounded by three sides) between the two



schools, Feel free to stop and take a look. The Discovery Garden has been a district wide collaboration. It started over a year ago when Sterling Roskom, a former Rock Ledge student, created the initial design for the garden. Bridget Staley, a member of the Seymour Community and of the Outagamie Master Gardener's, has provided her expertise with plants and plant location. As the project progressed we received help from some students in Bob Jankowski's class in the high school. They created and installed the raised beds. Later on in the year students working with Jon Kollath created a sign that will be placed this spring. Moreover, we received a lot of help from Barry Kailhofer and his staff in choosing and obtaining the soil for the raised beds. Many elementary and primary classrooms grew fruit and vegetables for the garden and were able to get them in the garden just before school got out for the 08-09 school year. Finally, we teamed up with Good Shepherd and their summer session students. These students under the wonderful guidance of Kristy Ibe-Davis kept our garden watered and flourishing all summer long. The products that were harvested went to the local food pantry. Thanks to Mr. Kabe for bringing them in.

This past fall compost was spread, which has given the plants a good start this spring. It has been a work in progress and will continue to be so. We hope to add to the garden this spring. A summer school art class will be creating some identification markers to label some of the plants which we already have planted.

As many of you begin to garden this spring, please think of us. You will find a list of desired plants below. We would love to add them to our garden and/or prairie. Please mark the plants with their names when they are dropped off at either the primary or intermediate office. This spring we will be accepting donations at Kailhofer's. You can add to an account that will be

used to purchase plants for the Discovery Garden.

Some specific plants we are hoping for:, Red, Orange or Yellow Milkweed, Sage, Thyme, Oregano, Walker's Low Cat Mint, Lemon Balm, Cone Flower, Malva, Phlox, Hosta, Black Eyed Susan, Autumn Joy Sedum, Butterfly Weed, Yarrow, Artemisia-Brocade

Seeds we are hoping for are: Carrots, Marigold, Pink or Purple Aster, Zinnia, Lantana, Dill

We hope that this Discovery Garden also becomes a "Community Garden". We are especially looking for individuals or families who would be willing to assist with watering, weeding and generally caring for the garden this summer. 2008-2009 SCHOOL PERFORMANCE REPORT

To the Parents and the Community

Wisconsin Statute requires school districts to annually distribute a "School Performance Report" to the parents of the children in the district upon request. The purpose of the report is to provide parents with a summary of the district's performance during the 2008-2009 school year. To assist in developing the report, the state provides state averages to compare to local performance.

The School Performance Report is now in its eighteenth year. With increased consistency in the report and state definitions, the information is becoming more valuable in efforts to monitor performance and plan for improvements. Statewide standards have been developed to compare district data.

In general, data again shows students attending the Seymour Community School District are performing very well in comparison to the state average.

The following are the minimum required immunizations for each age/grade level. It is not a recommended immunization schedule for infants and preschoolers. For that schedule, contact your doctor or local health department.

- 1. DTP/DTaP/DT vaccine for children entering Kindergarten: Your child must have received one dose after the 4th birthday (either the 3rd, 4th, or 5th) to be compliant. (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable).
- 2. DTP/DTaP/DT/Td vaccine for students entering Pre K and grades 1 through 12: Four doses are required. However, if your child received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable).
- Tdap means adolescent tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis vaccine. If your child received a dose of a tetanus-containing vaccine, such as Td, within 5 years of entering the grade in which Tdap is required, your child is compliant and a dose of Tdap vaccine is not required.
- 4. Polio vaccine for students entering grades <u>Kindergarten through 12</u>: Four doses are required. However, if your child received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable).
- 5. The first dose of MMR vaccine must have been received on or after the first birthday (Note: a dose 4 days or less before the 1st birthday is also acceptable).
- 6. Var means Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. A history of chickenpox disease is also acceptable.

Meetings previously held during the 2009-2010 school year will NOT apply to next school year's sports.
