School Cancellations and Delays

Wisconsin winter weather is unpredictable. Since we must make a decision by 5:45 a.m. whether or not to cancel school, the progress of the snowstorm plays an important role in trying to arrive at the best decision for the children in the district. The decision, made by 5:45 a.m. is then given to television and radio stations, as listed, to give parents, bus drivers, and school personnel the notice of the cancellation as quickly as possible.

When it becomes necessary to cancel school during the school day, several additional factors must be considered. A majority of families have both parents/guardians working outside the home. It is necessary to give adequate parent/guardian notification prior to sending children home on the bus at a time when no one is expecting the children to be coming home.

This is especially important for young children. We urge you to review an emergency plan with your children. Make certain that you have told them where to go in case of an early school closing. Should the child go home? To a relative's or neighbors house? Some other designated place? Have your child remind the teacher or report to the school office for help if they are confused about where to go.

Please do not call the school and tie up the lines. Listen to the stations listed below. Parents have the option of keeping their children home from school should they feel the weather conditions merit such action. According to School Board Policy, if parents choose to keep their children home due to weather conditions, the absence will be listed as "excused".

Local Student Nominated To Compete In National Award Program

Molly Upp, a Seymour High School senior has been

nominated to compete in the national Principal's Leadership Award (PLA) scholarship program, sponsored by the National Association of Secondary School Principals (NASSP). Herff Jones, Inc. funds the PLA program.

Michael Flaherty, principal, Seymour High School, today announced the nomination, which places Upp in the national competition. One hundred national PLA winners will be chosen this spring to receive College scholarships ranging from \$1,000 to \$12,000.

What is it?

An <u>interactive program for students</u> from Seymour High School designed to demonstrate the need for <u>money management skills</u>, provide an opportunity for students to <u>connect with community business</u> <u>leaders</u>, and allow students to <u>exercise budgeting</u> <u>skills</u>.

When is it?

We are looking to hold our first annual event: **Tuesday, March 8, 2011**.

Volunteers begin arriving at 7:15 AM. A brief orientation and question & answer session is held before the students arrive. Students begin arriving at staggered times throughout the morning beginning at 8:15 AM. The event is scheduled to end at noon serving approximately 200 high school students.

All students have selected an occupation and researched the monthly income for their occupation in this area of the country. During this simulation, students are 28 years old and married, but their spouse is unemployed. (It is a bad economy after all.) Each student visits a bank, deposits their pay, and receives a checkbook. After depositing their paycheck, Uncle Sam is waiting to deduct taxes. Prior to the day of the event, students have received instruction in the following areas:

- Career search & selection
- Checkbook balancing skills
- Check writing skills
- Budget preparation
- Student loans

Business volunteers are needed to sponsor booths such as housing, insurance, clothing, groceries, county government, utilities, etc. Students visit every booth during their time in the store and pay their monthly bills based on the choices they have made for housing and transportation and their family status. 2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR NOTIFICATION

As a result of federal legislation Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act - AHERA, each primary and secondary school in the nation is required to complete a stringent new inspection for asbestos and to develop a plan of management for all asbestos-containing building materials - ACBM. Seymour Community School District has a goal to be in full compliance with this law and is following the spirit, as well as the letter, of the law. As a matter of policy, Seymour Community School District shall continue to maintain a safe and healthful environment for our community's youth and employees.

In keeping with this legislation, all buildings (including portables and support buildings) owned or leased by the school district were inspected by EPA accredited inspectors and samples were analyzed by an independent laboratory. Based on the inspection, the school prepared and the state approved a comprehensive management plan for handling the asbestos located within its buildings safely and responsibly.

Furthermore, Seymour Community School District has completed its three-year re-inspection requirement by AHERA. Seymour Community School District buildings, where asbestos-containing materials were found, are under repair, removal and Operations and Maintenance.


This past year, Seymour Community School District conducted the following with respect to its asbestos containing building materials:

1) Removed, disposed and tested asbestos flooring and mastic in Rooms 212, 215, 222 and 228 at the Rock Ledge Intermediate Center.

Federal law requires a periodic walk-through (called surveillance) every six months of each area containing asbestos. Also the law requires all buildings to be reinspected three years after a management plan is in effect. This will be accomplished under contract by MacNeil Environmental, Inc.

Short-term workers (outside contractors - i.e. telephone repair workers, electricians and exterminators) must be provided information regarding the location of asbestos in which they may come into contact. All short-term workers shall contact the lead maintenance person for asbestos information before commencing work.

Seymour Community School District has a list of location(s) and type(s) of asbestos-containing materials found in that school building and a description and timetable for their proper management. A copy of the Asbestos Management Plan is available for review in the district office. Copies are available for 25 cents per page. Child Development Days

The Seymour Community School District provides evaluations and special services to those students identified as disabled in accordance with the state and federal guidelines. Each child between birth to 21 years of age is entitled to screening for, and evaluation of, suspected disabling conditions. These services are at no cost to the parents or student identified.

Child Development Days, a screening for children with special needs between three and five years of age, is held in October and April of each school year. If you have a child who will be at least 3 years, 3 months old by April 1st, 2011, you and your child will be invited to participate in **Seymour Community Schools Child Development Days.** This event is scheduled for April 12th, 2011 at Black Creek School (3:15 p.m.-5:05 p.m.) and at Rock Ledge Primary Center on both April 14th, 2011 (3:15 p.m. - 6:00 p.m.) and April 15th, 2011 (8:15 -11:00 a.m.) Please remember these times are approximate.

If you choose to participate in this event, your child will be involved in a small play group while you have the opportunity to meet other parents and talk with school personnel about normal growth and development. You can expect to spend about 40 minutes at school. Before you leave, a member of the screening staff will review her/his observations of your child's development with you as well as answer any questions you might have. We use our census lists to contact families who may be eligible for Early Childhood programs and also for four-year old five-year old Kindergarten screenings. If you are not sure if you are listed on our census, you may contact Marilyn and she can confirm your information. All children between the ages of new born through 20 years of age are counted on our census.
