Students and their families have prepared for high school graduation for many years. The following guidelines have been established so students in the Class of 2017 may be recognized with dignity and respect.

- All 2017 graduates are to attend graduation practice on Friday, June 2, at 10:00 a.m. in the field house. A picnic for the graduates will follow practice.
- The recommended dress code for graduates is: For male graduates: dress pants, shirt and tie, and dress shoes.

For female graduates: appropriate dresses or dress pants and shirt, and dress shoes.

- So families and friends can enjoy the ceremony with minimal distraction, a professional photograph of individual students receiving their diploma will be available to each graduate.
- Guests will be admitted to the field house by ticket only. Each graduate will receive 10 tickets for family and friends. If unused tickets are available, they will be distributed to graduates who register a need in the student services office prior to graduation practice.
- Graduates are expected to obey and respect all school rules. Violations of school rules may result in exclusion from the commencement ceremony and may require graduates to pick up their diploma from school officials at a designated meeting.

Seymour Community School District To Have A New Superintendent

The Seymour Board of Education selected Ms. Laurie Asher as the next superintendent of the Seymour Community School District. She will be returning in June from an international educational leadership position in Cairo, Egypt, and will assume the superintendent position July 1, 2017.

Laurie Asher has served as a special education paraprofessional, an elementary teacher, an elementary principal, a director of learning, an assistant superintendent and a superintendent in Wisconsin.

Her northeast Wisconsin roots are deep, serving as superintendent in the School District of Laona from 2012 to 2016 and serving the Kimberly Area School District from 2002 to 2012 in various administrative leadership roles including assistant superintendent.

Laurie Asher commented, "I am honored the Board chose me for this tremendous opportunity to serve the students, staff and community of the Seymour Community School District. During the interview process, I was extremely impressed with the students' engagement and staff commitment to their students' learning. Through the business department at Seymour, students are given many opportunities to explore and gather skills needed in the work field they will soon be entering. One of those opportunities is our school store, run by a team of managers that all started off in one of Mrs. Grassel's many business classes. This year the ThunderZone is run by four managers, Carley Kuske, Kaitlyn VandenHeuvel, Cody Dey, and McKendra Heinke. Together they work side by side to run a business. Students from Mrs. Grassel's marketing and accounting classes are the employees of the store. Students are presented with the opportunity to get work experience and explore careers in business. Managers of the store experience what it is like to operate a functioning business and make big decisions.

If marketing and accounting are not your thing don't worry, the business department offers a wide variety of classes for all levels of interests. For incoming freshman there are two classes available introduction to business, and computer information processing. These classes are a great introduction into the business department, where you learn the basics of business, and to type efficiently.

Some other classes available to students are web design and development, personal finance, Microsoft Office Application, Business Essentials, Graphic Communication Processes, Mobile App Development, and PC hardware essentials. In web design and development students learn how to make a website that is efficient and gets information to consumers easily. Personal finance is a great class to take when nearing the end of high school in order to prepare for life on your own. In this class you learn how to pay your taxes and other essential skills to prosper as an adult. In Microsoft Office Application students will learn the proper way to use Microsoft Office, and all of its little tricks. Graphic Communication Processes gives students a taste of graphic design and how it works. In Mobile App Development students learn how to make mobile apps for android systems. Then there is PC hardware essentials, if you are a hands on learner this is the class for

you. In this course students take apart computers and figure out what really makes them tick.

The business department is filled with many possibilities and opportunities for each and every student. Students may be interested in business and not even know it, with the business department students are presented with the opportunity to find out.

Here's What's Going on at Fallen Timbers

Maple sugar season ended a few weeks ago at Fallen Timbers Environmental Center; however, the spring season is now in full swing. The ephemeral ponds at Fallen Timbers are bursting with life. The students who have been coming here the past few weeks have studied the diversity of the creatures found in the ponds and were amazed at what they found. Also, many species of frogs are singing and they are the loudest at dusk. Wildflowers are beginning to bloom and the trees have buds and newly formed leaves on their branches. Migratory birds have also arrived and the pond has geese and ducks stopping for a rest on a daily basis.

Our spring programming has also begun with students attending Fallen Timbers from Ashwaubenon, De Pere, Little Chute, Seymour, West De Pere, and Wrightstown. We are doing off-site ecology and geology field work and some of the more popular classes on-site this time of year are: "Birds, Nests, and Eggs", "Pond Study", "Geocaching", "Tracks Traces" and "Environmental Ed Games", "Tree ID", and "Insect Studies".

We are very grateful for the number of students, teachers, and chaperones that attended the programs we offer at Fallen Timbers this spring. We are packed with programming through the first week of June and then summer school will take place here for the remaining three weeks in June.

The public is welcome to visit and walk our trails to enjoy all the exciting transformations that occur here in spring. During the week we ask the public to visit after 2:30 p.m. and anytime during the weekends. Bring your binoculars and walking shoes and explore the grounds at your leisure! Show your kids how delicious-and fun-fruits and vegetables can be! Fromfruity "jigsaw puzzles" to vegetable art, this page will spark your child's interest in eating her greens... and reds...and yellows. And every time she eats a fruit or veggie, she can color part of the rainbow on the back. Now, who's ready to get started?



Snack-time activities

Turn your youngster's next snack into a produce-filled adventure. Here's how.

3-D fruit puzzles

Can your child solve a watermelon jigsaw puzzle? Cut a firm fruit like melon, pineapple, pear, or apple into "puzzle pieces." After your youngster reassembles the fruit, she gets to eat it. Next, she could make a fruit puzzle for you to solve.



Veggie painting


Let your youngster create a masterpiece by "painting" with a variety of vegetables and dips. He could use celery stalks, asparagus spears, or jicama sticks as "paintbrushes." And

his "paints" might include guacamole, edamame hummus, or beet dip. Have him take a photo to save his picture. Now, he can dip the paintbrushes into his artwork and enjoy a veggieand-dip snack.

Fruity patterns

Encourage your child to enjoy fruit and practice math at the same time. Using colorful fruit like blueberries, strawberries, sliced bananas, and cut-up peaches, make patterns on skewers to solve and eat. You might start a pattern like blueberry, blueberry, peach, blueberry,

to figure out the next fruit to add (peach). Ask her to make a pattern for you to finish, too.



A tasty ad campaign

Suggest that your youngster create posters to promote fruits and vegetables he enjoys. He might cut out pictures of the produce from magazines or grocery circulars and glue them on paper. Then, he could write slogans ("Guava is cooler than lava!") and draw and label snacks that include the item (tropical fruit salad, guava parfait). Help him unveil his ad campaign with a tasting event for friends or family.

Side dishes

Include more fruits and vegetables at mealtime with these ideas.

Replace grains with veggies

Finely sliced or shredded vegetables can stand in for pasta or rice. Serve your family's favorite spaghetti sauce over zucchini "noodles." Or grate carrots to make a bed of "rice" for a chicken and vegetable stir-fry.

Serve fruit salsa

Add flavor to tacos, grilled fish, and salads with this easy salsa recipe. Peel and dice 1 mango and+cucumber. Toss with 1 tbsp. each chopped jalapeno, red onion, and cilantro. Add 1 tbsp. lime juice. *Tip:* Let your child help you experiment with different fruit salsas, such as apple, strawberry. peach, or pineapple.

Roast vegetables

Cooking vegetables at high temperatures brings out their natural sweetness. Cut I lb. broccoli, yellow squash, pota-toes, or eggplant into small pieces. Place in a large plastic bag, and add I tbsp. olive oil. Your youngster can shake it vigorously, then spread the veggies in a single layer on a cookie sheet. Roast at 425 for 10 minutes.
