# 2013-2014 SCHOOL YEAR ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION

As a result of federal legislation Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act - AHERA, each primary and secondary school in the nation is required to complete a stringent new inspection for asbestos and to develop a plan of management for all asbestos-containing building materials - ACBM. Seymour Community School District's goal is to be in full compliance with this law and is following the spirit, as well as the letter, of the law. As a matter of policy, Seymour Community School District shall con-

tinue to maintain a safe and healthful environment for our community's youth and employees.

In keeping with this legislation, all buildings (including portables and support buildings) owned or leased by the school district were inspected by EPA accredited inspectors and samples were analyzed by an independent laboratory. Based on the inspection, the school prepared and the state approved a comprehensive management plan for handling the asbestos located within its buildings safely and responsibly.

Furthermore, Seymour Community School District has completed its three-year re-inspection requirement by AHERA. Seymour Community School District buildings, where asbestos-containing materials were found, are under repair, removal or being monitored and maintained.

This past year, Seymour Community School District conducted the following with respect to its asbestos containing building materials:

1) Removed asbestos containing materials from Rooms 352 and 353 from the Seymour Middle School in February of 2013.

Federal law requires a periodic walk-through (called surveillance) every six months of each area containing asbestos. Also the law requires all buildings to be reinspected three years after a management plan is in effect. This will be accomplished under contract by MacNeil Environmental, Inc.

Short-term workers (outside contractors - i.e. telephone repair workers, electricians and exterminators) must be provided information regarding the location of asbestos in which they may come into contact. All short-term workers shall contact the lead maintenance person for asbestos information before commencing work.

Seymour Community School District has a list of location(s) and type(s) of asbestos-containing materials found in that school building and a description and timetable for their proper management. A copy of the Asbestos Management Plan is available for review in the district office. Copies are available for 25 cents per page. # WHEN TO KEEP YOUR CHILD HOME SICK FROM SCHOOL

In general, your child should stay home from school if he or she is too uncomfortable to participate in all activities and stay in the classroom; if he needs more medical attention than the school can give, or if she might be spreading harmful diseases/illnesses to others.

"If you think they're not going to learn much or they will be miserable, it's not worthwhile" (Joseph Bresee, CDC, Aug 2012).

Here are some of the most common childhood illnesses:

**Fever:** A child with a low-grade temperature, without any other symptoms, who feels perfectly normal can probably go to school. Sometimes children's temperatures may fluctuate, so, behavior rather than a low-grade temperature is often better to look at when questioning if a child is sick.

Rash: Irritations of the skin are somewhat tricky because they could be a few things. It could be a harmless allergic reaction, a sign of serious illness, a slight virus, or just irritation due to weather, allergies, or friction. Also, some rashes do not show up until the child has already been contagious for few days.

A rash that is not accompanied with fever, symptoms, or change in behavior is usually not a cause of concern. However, if the child has a rash with other symptoms, may want to see your pediatrician.

Cold: If student can do his/her work and is not disturbing classmates he/she can attend school with mild symptoms of stuffy nose, low-grade temperature, and cough. By the time students have symptoms they have already likely been contagious. Most of those who work in schools are exposed to the common cold viruses regularly.

Influenza: Stay Home! This is beyond the common cold, symptoms include: higher fever, body aches or pain, fatigue, sore throat, severe cough, or overall just a general feeling of blah. Temperatures with the flu can be over 102°. Often just by looking at your kids you can tell they are sick.

Eye Discharge: It is how it sounds, eye discharge usually accompanied by pink/red color to the whites of the eyes. It is called conjunctivitis (pink eye) and can be caused by viruses, bacteria, or allergens. Those that are viral or bacterial are contagious. It is hard to tell the difference between pink eye and just an eye irritation. Usually if there is a crusty, thick, yellowish drainage you should keep them home and call your pediatrician to get some antibiotic eye drops prescribed. They should be on the drops for 24 hours before returning to school. Really good hand washing and sanitizing things in their reach is a good way to stop the spread.

**Sore Throat:** There are a few causes of sore throat: a bacteria called strep, irritation from a respiratory infection, or sinus drainage. If the sore throat is not severe and there is no fever your child can go to school. If there is a fever, bellyache, headache, or rash with the sore throat it could be strep throat. Most of the time you can make a lab only appointment just to get a strep test to rule out strep. If your child has strep he should not go to school until having been on the antibiotics for 24 hours. If the sore throat is simply viral he should stay home until fever free for 24 hours.

**Vomiting & Diarrhea:** If your child has vomiting or diarrhea she needs to stay home from school. Unless you are absolutely convinced it is a one time deal she should stay home until symptom free for 24 hours.

### Prevention:

A simple step to prevent illnesses is frequent hand washing or sanitizing. Hand washing should be with soap, warm water, and scrubbing for at least 20 seconds. Remind them to cough and sneeze into their elbows and keep their hands away from their face and eyes. Getting the flu vaccine will also help prevent influenza which can cause kids to miss up to two weeks of school or more.

line behavior, or a number of other ideas that show that the student will make a better choice next time.

At an assembly in January, nearly every student had their hand in the air when asked if they liked the way PBIS is going! As an incentive, if they can prove that they can be "above the line" for a whole month, each student will get a piece of duct tape to tape Mr. Kempen to the wall! # A Message from the Superintendent

Winter has arrived with full force this year. Unprecedented and severe wind chills combined with a deep freeze resulted in three days off school in early January. This deep chill was followed closely by a snow storm that impacted another full day cancellation. As a result we have used all the days built into our school calendar for weather State statute requires all public cancellations. schools to schedule 180 days of instruction and to meet a minimum number of hours of instruction. Superintendents are allowed to call off school for inclement weather and/or parent conferences no more than 5 days. Even though we are still in compliance with the statute regarding days of instruction, we are now at the minimum number of hours. Any late start or early dismissal will put the district below the minimum and create the need for additional time.

In an attempt to avoid adding extra time at the end of the school year, school will now be held on

February 28, 2014 rather than holding parent conferences that day. Parent conferences will still be held the evening of February 27, 2014. This preemptive move will provide the students with an additional face to face day of instruction and add hours to our total that may be necessary to offset any late starts or early dismissals. In the unfortunate event we continue to have full day closures due to severe winter weather, the district may be holding school on Monday April 21, 2014 as well as additional day(s) in June. This decision will be made early in April and information will be immediately provided to our families.

Safe travel for our children on winter roads is our highest priority. Please remember to send your children to school with warm winter clothing. Even on colder days, children can spend several minutes outdoors. Warm hats, coats, mittens and boots are a must. We can all enjoy the winter weather if we are prepared.

### **Intruder Training**

On Wednesday, January 15, faculty and staff of the Seymour School District were invited to observe an Active Intruder Practice Drill at Rock Ledge Primary Center. The drill was hosted by the City of Seymour Police Department. The practice lasted about an hour and included threat stopping drills, which included simulated gun fire, and room/building clearing exercises. The intent of the training was to inform staff what it may sound and look like in the event of an intruder within our school buildings. The SCSD Safety Team, working in conjunction with local law enforcement, have practiced educational lockdowns in all buildings and

are continually working to ensure our preparedness in the event that the safety of our students should be threatened.
