

WHAT IS A SIMILES

Comparing two <u>UNLIKE</u> things using <u>LIKE or AS</u>

Good Example:

 Her smile was like a refreshing rain that revitalized everyone who came in contact with her.

HOW ARE METAPHORS **DIFFERENT**THAN SIMILES?

 METAPHORS compare two UNLIKE things saying one this <u>IS</u> the other thing <u>instead</u> of just like it.

GOOD EXAMPLE:

• "If people were rain, I was drizzle and she was a hurricane."

EVALUATING EXAMPLES: WHAT IS WRONG WITH THESE EXAMPLE

WHY ISN'T IT A SIMILE OR A METAPHOR?

BAD EXAMPLE:

Mike is like Mathew?

YOU ALSO WANT TO BE UNIQUE AND AVOID CLICHÉS WHICH WE ALREADY HEARD BEFORE.

Good Example:

Grandpa lounged on the raft in the middle of the pool like an old battleship.

Bad Example:

He was as slow as molasses.

DESCRIBING GATSON FROM BEAUTY AD THE BEAST WITHOUT SIMILES OR METAPHORS

- Gaston is evil.
- He is French.
- He wears a red shirt and black tights.
- He has brown boots and a brown belt.
- His hair is black and his eyes are green.
- He smirks a lot.



USING SIMILES AND METAPHORS TO DESCRIBE GATSON

- His pride wraps around him, a blanket shielding him from anyone offering humility.
- His cruelty towards Belle is thunderous; he steals her book, tries to trap her into marriage and almost kills the one she loves.
- He wears a red tunic, which looks like blood; it fits around his muscles that are as large as tree trunks.
- His black hair shines like the darkness and his eyes are as green as jade.

 Which description gives you a better idea of what he is like as a character? The first example with <u>no</u> similes/metaphors <u>or</u> the second <u>with</u> similes/metaphors?
